The 2008-2009 Junior class of Elgin Public Schools has participated in this year' JUMP program offered by UNL. The JUMP program is a 45-minute mathematics test for Nebraska high school students. Its purpose is to determine the level of each participant's mathematical preparation, and to make recommendations suggested by the student's test score and posthigh school educational plans. The immediate objective of the program is to guide each participating student to the most appropriate high school mathematics courses, as suggested by the student's test score and future educational plans. The long range goal is to bring about a substantial reduction in the number of Nebraska students whose high school preparation forces them to begin their college mathematics at a remedial level.

In years past, we have only tested students in advanced math classes. This year, we included students taking Applied Business Math. The average score of this year's juniors is a 45.1 percentile compared to last year's score of 60.3 percentile. Elgin High has been participating since 1990. The average score of the last nineteen years is a 61.579 percentile.

"Slow and steady wins the race," would be a good quote to sum up this year's Elgin Public Speech Team. The team started off the season by competing at the Cedar Rapids Invite on Wednesday, February 4. The students competed against approximately thirty area

Invite on Wednesday, February 4. The students competed against approximately thirty area teams in classes C and D. Many individual and group events received superior and excellent ratings.

Next, the team was slated to compete at the Lindsay Holy Family Meet on Friday, February 13. But as superstition would have it, the meet was cancelled due to snow. The next meet at Pope John, scheduled for Saturday, February 28 suffered the same fate.

With only one contest under their belts, the team traveled to Niobrara for the Conference meet on Tuesday,

March 3. Again, many individual and group events received superior and excellent ratings, while the duet acting team of Jeff Bush and Nathan Niewohner placed 6th overall.

The D-1-3 District Speech Contest at Bancroft-Rosalie High School proved to be much more successful for the team. The OID Team (Jeff Bush, Nathan Niewohner, Linsey Bode, Carlie Redding, and Eric Shoemaker) placed 2nd overall. Linsey Bode also placed 2nd in Informative Speaking. This resulted in both events qualifying for the State Speech Contest in Kearney on Friday, March 20. The duet acting team narrowly missed qualifying for a slot at the state competition.

At the state contest, Linsey Bode received a 5th place medal in Informative Speaking. The OID team received superior ratings in both preliminary rounds, but did not make finals.

Co-coaches for the team this year were Stacy Shumake-Henn and Jessie Reestman, both of whom very much enjoyed working with members of the team. They were constantly amazed at the talents these individuals possess in a variety of areas outside of the speech realm. As a result, the dedication and commitment of this year's members was evident and admirable.

ANATOMY STUDENTS TOUR BRIAR CLIFF



The Anatomy & Physiology class recently visited Briar Cliff University in Sioux City, IA. During the trek up the large hills from the van, they realized why the university was

called Briar *Cliff*. The class first visited the cadaver; they were then treated to a visit to the college's insect zoo.

Before the students viewed the cadaver, Dr. Bob Olsen, a professor at Briar Cliff, gave facts about the cadaver such as his name, age, and what he had died from. The cadaver this term was a 78-year old male who had a number of health problems. When the class finally entered the dissection room, they were able to see firsthand what Dr. Olsen had prepared them for. The man had been a smoker;

lungs. He had been an alcoholic and white cirrhosis spots were visible on his liver. He also suffered from a heart condition which could be seen by the damage to the heart tissue. Though suffering from a number of ailments, the gentleman ultimately died from pneumonia. Students were allowed to hold various organs like the brain and heart. They were even able to feel the gallstones in his gall bladder.

After their campus tour, students were visitors in the college's new Insect Zoo. College students presented information and a hands-on learning experience about the insects they were caring for. From the giant millipede, cockroaches, and tarantula, to the three-colored scorpion, each student had the opportunity to hold the insects (though not all took the chance!).

Seniors ... it's decision time!

Attention seniors: It's time to make the big college decision and determine where you'll spend the next 4-5 years of your life! As you make your decision, have a heart-to-heart talk with your parents to make sure you pick your college for the right reasons, not because it's where your friends - or your girlfriend or boyfriend - are going. Talk about the following:

- Location. Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If travel costs are prohibitive, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.
- **Cost.** Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond the freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships?
- Academic program. Does the college offer the program that interests you? What happens if you change majors—does the college offer other programs of interest?
- Amount of loans required. If you borrow the maximum Stafford loan amount each year for four years, you're looking at \$27,000 in loans and that means a future monthly payment of approximately \$300 per month. But what a great investment! You should also calculate how much your parents will need to borrow in PLUS loans. Use the <u>Student Loan</u> <u>Repayment Calculator</u> at EducationQuest.org to estimate future student loan payments.

The EducationQuest Web site features other tools that can help you make the final decision including the <u>Award Letter</u> <u>Comparison Calculator</u> and the <u>College Comparison Calculator</u>.

Juniors ... start looking for scholarships

Thousands of scholarships are available to help students pay for college. Students who earn the most scholarships complete *at least* 30-40 applications. Here's how you can be one of those students ...

- Start searching! In addition to your guidance office, check out free sites including <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org. Note the awards current seniors are receiving - they're often listed in your local newspaper. Other sources might include your parent's employer, your employer or local service organizations.
- Create files and place scholarship applications in deadline order.
- Get involved in extracurricular activities and community service. This is a critical component on most scholarship applications and is the only criteria on some.
- Earn the best possible grades and entrance exam scores. These factors are especially important for college-based scholarships.
- Determine if you will qualify for need-based scholarships by completing the <u>College Funding Estimator</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Talk to colleges about specific scholarships they offer.

As a junior or senior, you'll receive offers for scholarship and financial aid services. If they charge a fee, investigate them thoroughly. EducationQuest will help you complete financial aid forms for free and will guide you to free scholarship search resources. It helps to promote increased physical activity levels and help children make healthy food choices. Since 16 percent of all children and teens in the U.S. are overweight. The American Heart Association is proud to be a part of helping kids become healthier.

Helpful Hints to Recognize Heart Attack and Stroke

Heart attack warning signs:

- Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of the chest that last more than a few minutes or goes away and comes back.
- Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach
- Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.
- Other signs of breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

Stroke warning signs:

- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
- Sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

What is Jump Rope for Heart?

It's a rope-jumping special event program. It promotes community service by raising funds to support lifesaving heart and stroke research and educational programs while teaching physical Fitness.

Why is Jump Rope for Heart Important?

- -Heart Disease and stroke are America's No. 1 and No.3 killers and touch all of our lives.
- -More than 9.2 million children and adolescents are considered overweight or obese, based on the 95th percentile or higher body mass index.
- Type II diabetes is on the rise in children. If current trends continue, adolescents with Type II diabetes may experience heart troubles beginning as young as 30 or 40.
- Obesity increases a person risk for heart disease, Type II diabetes, stroke and many other chronic illnesses and leads to higher healthcare costs.
- The American Heart Association is working in every state and federal level to require quality physical education to be offered in all grades.

In September of 2000, a movie hit the theaters titled "Remember the Titans". It stared a number of high profile actors including Denzel Washington. The movie, which was based on a true story, won many awards that year. As an avid sports fan, I must say it is one of my all-time favorite sports movies. Those that have watched the movie may recall the one line in the movie where the character named Sheryl, who played a child throughout most of the movie and then as a young woman in the end stated the following line..."People say that it can't work black and white; well here we make it work, everyday. Schedules, assignment of coaches, mascot, colors and a plethora of other areas will need to be addressed. The administration will continue to work collaboratively to make sure that the plans are in place so that when the school year starts in August, we are ready to go. Just like in the movie, "Remember the Titans", there will be "disagreements" or bumps in the road. There will be times where people will question if it was the right thing to do. Only time will tell if the boards made the right decisions. No matter what, I believe that our cooperatives will only work if all who are involved give them a chance. When I addressed the student body at Elgin High School, I stated the decisions that the boards had made and I challenged them to be positive leaders through the coming months and the changes that will be involved. I asked the senior class of 2010 to be leaders and let them know that their character will be on display more than ever. I explained that in the coming year, we will find out if they are the kind of young adults that have the integrity to come together for a common goal. I have known most of our students here at Elgin High School for many years and I believe they will be great in coming together with the students from Pope John Central to compete as one.

Just as was stated in the movie, people have and will continue to say that sports cooperatives in the community of Elgin cannot be done...they will say that it will not work. They may be right and as I stated before only time will tell. I, however, am confident that if we all give it a chance and before we reach for hate; before we criticize those who are competing, coaching and making the decisions that impact the future of both schools, let us remember what is important. Let us remember that line in that classic movie and maybe someday we can look back and be glad we were able to come together and compete as one.

On a different note, the school year is winding down and before we know it, we will be focusing our attentions on completing another great school year. I am extremely proud of the manner in which the majority of our students have worked this year and especially these past few weeks.
