Elgin Public Schools in Elgin hosted the Niobrara Valley Conference Band Clinic on Tuesday, March 22, 2011. The guest clinician was Mr. Brad Weber. Mr. Weber is the director of instrumental music at Wayne Community Schools in Wayne, Nebraska.

Schools participating in the clinic were Clearwater, Elgin, Ewing, Niobrara, Orchard, and Verdigre. The clinic began with a 12:15 rehearsal session and continued throughout the afternoon. Mr. Weber and the directors were pleasantly surprised at how good the band sounded after the first run through of music. We knew that this was going to be a concert to remember. The afternoon was spent fine tuning the pieces as all the students came well prepared. Mr. Weber commented that he has done many honor bands and this was the first that he NEVER had to ask them to be quiet. He was very impressed with their behavior and maturity.


There was an evening concert open to the public at the Elgin Public School Gym. We had a nice audience for the event. The concert began with the Elgin band performing 'Overbrook'. Next was Verdigre's band with 'Winning Tradition' a nice march. Clearwater performed a ballad 'Shenandoah'. The individual performances ended with 'Heartstrings' by the Orchard Wind Ensemble. The mass band performed 5 pieces together beginning with 'Conquest' (a king tries to regain his castle after a big siege) written by a Nebraska composer Nolan Schmidt (first teaching position was at Orchard). Next was 'A Sailor's Odessey' - a song using the melody of 'What Shall We Do With A Drunken Sailor'. A song everyone recognizes by the Beatles was a fun piece to play – 'Eleanor Rigby'. The fourth song was written for a Nebraska landmark – 'Niobrara River Sketches' a medley that included Tubing, Sunset and a Hoedown. The concert concluded with a Karl King march entitled 'Our Heritage March'. The band did such an outstanding performance that they received a standing ovation. It was a wonderful night of music!





Chicken Pox Vaccine

Next school year <u>every student</u> will need to have TWO vaccinations for the chicken pox (varicella) or will need to show documentation form a parent/ guardian that your child has had this disease (if your child has previously had the chicken pox disease and you have already signed the documentation form, you will not need to sign it again.).

You are being given this early notice so that you may have ample time to meet the requirements of this new law.

Goldenrod Hills Immunization Clinic is a resource available to families whose children need the second chicken pox (varicella) immunization. You can schedule an appointment for one of their monthly clinics by calling 402-529-3513 or 1-800-445-2505. They hold clinics in Neligh and Norfolk as well as other area towns. You may also schedule an appointment with your local physician for the necessary vaccination. Please return documentation to the school nurse as soon as your child has received their second vaccination.

BOAT FLOAT

This month we learned that the freshmen class is crammed with future engineers-at least when it comes to boat building! For the annual Physical Science "Boat Float" contest, students were challenged to build a boat that would hold the most weight. They could use any products, except a premade boat. After learning the necessary information regarding buoyant force, fluid pressure, and density, students had the opportunity to put this knowledge to use in their boatbuilding assignment. They found that air pockets, high sides, sturdy design, and the ability to evenly distribute weight were the critical elements to designing a successful boat. Their creativity was evident by the wide variety of materials and designs used. This year's winner was Stephanie Bode whose design shattered the old Boat Float records with a whopping 9900 g! The second place boat was built by Abbi Couch (4250 g) and third place was built by Hunter Thramer (3500 g). 

Seniors ... it's decision time!

Attention seniors: If you haven't already, it's time to make the big college decision and determine which school you plan to attend. Follow our advice below to find the college that's the right fit for you.

First, gather and compare your college acceptance notifications, financial aid award notifications and your campus visit notes. Consider items such as:

• Location. Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If travel costs are prohibitive, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.

• **Cost.** Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in student and parent loans will you need to cover expenses?

• Academic program. Does the college offer the program that interests you? What happens if you change majors—does the college offer other programs that interest you?

Student life. Does the school offer student activities you will enjoy? Do you like the living arrangements provided by the school? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus? Will the career center help you find internships, create a resume, and prepare for interviews?

As you make your decision, have a heart-to-heart talk with your parents to make sure you pick your college for the right reasons, not because it's where your friends - or your girlfriend or boyfriend - are going.

Juniors ... start looking for scholarships

Scholarships are available to help you pay for college, but you have to apply! If you're serious about earning scholarships, plan to complete as many as 30-40 applications. Here's how to get started ...

- Start searching! In addition to your guidance office, check out free online sites including <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org - it contains over 2,000 local and state scholarships. Pay attention to scholarships current seniors are receiving - they're often listed in your local newspaper. Other sources might include your parent's employer, your employer or local service organizations.
- Create files and place scholarship applications in deadline order.
- Get involved in extracurricular activities and community service. This is a critical component on most scholarship applications – and is the only criteria on some. Track your involvement with the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible grades and entrance exam scores. These factors are especially important for collegebased scholarships.
- Determine if you will qualify for need-based scholarships by completing the <u>College Funding Estimator</u> at EducationQuest.org.

Talk to colleges about specific scholarships they offer. You'll also want to check out tuition assistance programs like the University of Nebraska's <u>Collegebound program</u>, and the <u>Advantage Program</u> offered by the Nebraska State College System. These programs will cover the cost of your tuition if you meet certain income and academic criteria.

As a junior or senior, you'll receive offers for scholarship and financial aid services. If they charge a fee, investigate them thoroughly. Kindergarten Round-up is scheduled for Tuesday, April 12 at 7:00 PM. Again this year any child who turns 5 on or before October 15, 2011 is eligible to attend kindergarten. Looking ahead, the implementation of LB 1006 begins with the 2012 - 13 school year. A child will then be eligible to attend kindergarten if they turn 5 on or before July 31 of the calendar year in which the school year for which the child is seeking admission begins. This will be a change from the long standing benchmark on kindergarten entrance. Again, this is the last year with the October 15 cut-off date.

NeSA Assessments

The NeSA assessments will take place at the start of April for all students in grade 3rd-8th and 11th. Each student will take two reading and two math assessments that we will receive scores. Students will also take two science assessments that we will not receive scores. The science assessments are being administered merely to test the questions for next year.

Nebraska Department of Education developed these assessments as a tool to compare schools and school districts. However, we do use the information that we gather from the assessments for more than a comparison tool at Elgin Public Schools. The scores are a part of our school improvement plan.

It is my goal and the goal of the staff to prepare the students as best we can for these assessments. As a staff, we want to make sure students are prepared and comfortable with the assessments so their focus is on answering the questions. Here are a few of the things the teachers have been doing to ensure a positive test taking experience:

taking tutorials about the system taking practice assessments reviewing content and skills planning to assess in the mid-morning providing a healthy snack talking about the assessments

As parents, there are a few things you can do that will help your student succeed: sleep for 8 hours the night before eat a protein as part of breakfast talk to them about the assessments encourage students to spend as much time as they need stay positive about the assessments make sure your student is in attendance on assessment dates!

NeSA assessment dates are: 3^{rd} grade, 4^{th} grade, 5^{th} grade and 6^{th} grades – April 5^{th} , 6^{th} , 7^{th} and 8^{th} 7^{th} grade and 8^{th} grade – April 12^{th} , 13^{th} , 19^{th} and 20^{th} 11^{th} grade - April 12^{th} , 13^{th} , 19^{th} and 21^{st}

We will also complete our MAP assessments in early May. More information will be sent home about MAP following the NeSA assessments.

Please let me know if you have any questions about the assessments. I am looking forward to another successful assessment season!

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
