LAUNCH SOON Elgin Public Schools will soon be launching an automatic calling system to alert parents, students, and staff in the event of emergency closures, late starts, or early dismissals. This system will also be an important communication tool in the event of a school lockdown. Alert Now rapid communication

> for us. The Alert Now system will use the phone numbers, cell numbers, and e-mail addresses listed in our Schoolmaster student information system. After initial contact is made by school officials, Alert Now calls and e-mails everyone on the list within minutes. This system will also leave voice mail on cell phones or a message on home answering machines. The

services have been contracted to perform the automatic calling

number 411 will show on your caller ID for all emergency notifications. This effort should result in quicker notification for all involved.

The Alert Now system can also be used for non-emergency situations. If a nonemergency notification is sent, the school's telephone number will appear on your caller ID. Perhaps the third grade is taking a field trip and a message can be sent to all 3rd graders to remind them to bring their permission slip. In the event that the One-Act sponsor is sick and morning practice needs to be cancelled, a message can be sent to all cast & crew members. Sometimes general messages will remind parents of parent-teacher conferences or student registration night. As the Alert Now system becomes commonplace, many more uses will become apparent.

Because the system will be using the information on our computerized information system, it is very important that we have current phone numbers for all parents, students, and staff. Soon a phone number confirmation letter will be sent to all parents. This letter will list the contact information that is imported into the system. It is very important to double-check the phone numbers and e-mail addresses that we have listed for your child and make any corrections to our listings. Return this letter to the school as soon as possible so we can update our information.

School staff is being trained in the system and when it is ready to be implemented, a test message will be sent. This will be a good indicator of incorrect phone numbers or numbers that you do not wish to have on the list.

The ultimate goal is that this notification service will result in more accurate and reliable communication between school and home.

SCIENCE FAIR PREP BEGINS

It's science fair time once again! The date has been set for March 8th from 7 -9 pm. Everyone is welcome to learn more about how a person's color vision in the dark, if food/tobacco/

drink choices affect mouth bacteria, how glass can be etched using acid, and much, much more!

The first and most crucial step of the science fair has been completed—choosing a topic! Students have since stated their problems and are currently working on their research. It won't be long before they make a hypothesis—only then can testing begin! For a thorough project, it is important for each student to complete each step so they can have a valid set of results and draw meaningful conclusions.

And as in past years, eight-graders may also have the option of taking their project to the regional Health Science Meet held in Norfolk. If chosen, these students may attend the 3day state meet during the summer in which they participate in hands-on health science activities.

This year *all* students will complete each step and submit their progress over ANGEL, the digital network that allows documents to be sent, graded, and returned with comments—all on-line. This will further help to reduce the amount of paper used since students



will only print off their final versions. Students are also encouraged to use technology in their testing and displaying of material.

Counselor's Corner

It's FAFSA Time!

If you're a college-bound senior, it's time to get serious about the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) - the application for state, federal and college-specific financial aid. February is typically the time to apply as many colleges have a March 1 priority filing date. (Contact the colleges you applied to and ask for their priority date.)

Follow these steps to complete the FAFSA...

Step 1: Request a PIN

Request a Personal Identification Number (PIN) for you and one for a parent at <u>**pin.ed.gov**</u>. The PIN is your signature for the electronic FAFSA and is used to track your financial aid application.

Step 2: Complete your taxes early

The FAFSA requires current tax information so complete your taxes early.

Step 3: Gather these student and parent items:

- 2009 federal income tax forms and, if applicable, Schedule K-1 (Form 1065)
- 2009 W-2 forms
- Student's driver's license number
- Social Security numbers
- Birth dates
- Date parents were married, separated, divorced or widowed
- Current cash, savings and checking account balances
- Current investment values (stocks, bonds, mutual funds, CDs, etc.) excluding retirement accounts
- Value of business (if more than 100 employees)
- Value of investment farm (Do not include the value of a family farm that you or your parents live on and operate.)
- 2009 child support (paid and/or received)
- 2009 Worker's Compensation
- Other untaxed income in 2009 such as veteran's benefits, housing/food/living allowances for military and clergy Alien Registration Number for eligible non-citizens

Step 4: Complete and file the FAFSA

Complete and file the FAFSA at <u>fafsa.gov</u>. The colleges you list on the application will receive the results.

If you're filing the FAFSA for the first time and need help completing the form, call the EducationQuest location nearest you to set up an appointment. Call the Kearney office at 800-666-3721, Lincoln at 800-303-3745 or Omaha at 888-357-6300. All services are *free*. **Online FAFSA enhancements make it easier to complete**. As you and your parents prepare to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), be aware of some enhancements to the online form that may make it easier to complete. They include:

- better "skip logic" which skips unnecessary questions based on individual answers
- a new "help and tips" tool that follows each question
- clearly defined parent and student sessions

EducationQuest has several online tools that also make it easier to complete the FAFSA. They are available in the <u>"Completing the FAFSA</u>" section at EducationQuest.org.

- <u>"Guide to College Funding" video</u> explains the financial aid process and the FAFSA
- "FAFSA Made Easy" video demonstrates, in a humorous way, that the FAFSA isn't as difficult as it seems
- <u>FAFSA Checklist</u> provides a list of items needed to complete the FAFSA
- <u>FAFSA Tutorial</u> explains each FAFSA question

The weather continues to be an enigma! The scary part is there are predictions that there will be more rough spots before spring arrives. In order to inform parents about school starts due to weather, schedule changes, meetings and other school news in a more timely manner we are in the process of installing a new telephone notification system, Alertnow. Alertnow will enable us to send a mass calling to parents, teachers and other selected members of the Elgin Public School district. You will get the information at your designated telephone number(s). This will require you to make sure we have current working telephone numbers than we can incorporate into the calling system. Please double check with Paula at school to make sure we have your current information.

The annual "Reorganization of the Board of Education" was completed at the regular January school board meeting. Included in this is the election of board officers. Results of the election were: Steve Heithoff, President; Mary Bauer, vice president; Laurie Waterbury, secretary; and Stan Heithoff, treasurer. The remaining board members are Kim Wells and Ryan Reestman. Each member also serves on two of the following committees: Negotiations, Insurance, Athletics, Building and Grounds, Transportation and Americanism. Committee assignments will be made at a upcoming board meeting. Should you have a desire to serve your district as a school board member now is the time to be thinking along these lines. Incumbents Mary Bauer, Ryan Reestman and Steve Heithoff must file at the court house by February 15. The filing date for non-incumbents is March 1, 2010. If you have questions concerning serving on the school board, please call or stop in the office.

There are 180 student days scheduled for the school year. This puts well over the number of hours the state requires, 1080 hours. Even with the number of days we have missed we still exceed the 1080 hour minimum. However, should we miss more days due to weather we may need to add additional days. Days we presently do not have school scheduled that we could use for this purpose are: Easter Monday, April 5; Girls' State Basketball, March 5; Boys' State Basketball, March 12 and State Wrestling on February 19.

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE



Bill Kuester, Class of 1968

Elgin Public Schools is proud to release the name of the recent inductee to the Elgin Public School Athletic Hall of Fame.

Bill Kuester, a 1968 graduate of Elgin Public School, will be inducted February 9, 2010, at the Elgin Public School/ Pope John basketball game. Kuester received numerous letters and several distinguished awards throughout his involvement in football, basketball, and track at EPS. He also held a variety of records in many sports.

Throughout his football career, he was a fouryear letter winner. He was also named an all-state football player in '67 and '68 by the *Omaha World Herald*. Kuester was also named to the Top Twenty Northeast Nebraska Football by the *Norfolk Daily News* and was a two- year all conference football player. In addition, Bill Kuester helped lead his teams to two

conference championships, an undefeated season in 1968, and a number one ranking in Class D Football. Finally,

Kuester was selected to play in the Shrine Bowl as a member of the North Team. On the basketball court, Kuester also played an integral role as a four-year

letter winner. He played on the 1968 conference champion basketball team and helped lead his team to an undefeated regular season and a trip to the state tournament. In addition, the 1968 basketball team was listed as a top 10 final placing.

In track and field, Kuester excelled in the shot and discus. He was a two-year conference champion in shot and discus. To top off his amazing high school career, Kuester was the 1968 state champion in the discus.

Bill Kuester's athletic career continued into college. He attended Chadron State College, where he competed in football. He received many honors. He was a four -year letter winner, three-year starter, and two-year all conference selection.

Kuester went on to graduate from Chadron State College with a degree in teaching. The past 36 years he has taught, coached and served as an administrator.

H1N1 INFLUENZA VACCINATION SCHOOL CLINICS WELL ATTENDED

The North Central District Health Department, based in O'Neill, offered two free H1N1 influenza vaccination clinics at Elgin Public Schools.

The first free clinic was held on December 18th, the vaccine was available to all students, preschool through 12th grade, plus the general public, from 8:30am to 10:00am. There were 78 school children and 53 from the general public that received the vaccine.

The second free clinic was held on January 13th, the vaccine was again offered to

all students from 2:30pm to 3:30pm and also to the general public from 3:30 to 6:30pm. There were 29 school children and 82 from the



general public that received the vaccine.

Statewide Assessments

The state of Nebraska is transitioning into standardizing assessments for all schools. In the previous system, schools were required to report scores, but not necessarily from the same assessment. The current set-up will require schools to assess reading, writing, math, and science through a statewide assessment.

The transition to the statewide assessment has begun. In this school year, 2009-2010, reading and writing will be reported through a statewide assessment, while math and science will be reported through an outside assessment chosen by the individual districts. By the 2011-2012 school year, the statewide assessments will be required in all four content areas. There will continue to be a requirement to report a national assessment as there is now.

In education, terms like "measurable," "data driven," and "accountable" have motivated many of the decisions that will impact the future. Some people are against the idea of "high-stakes testing," a term commonly used for tests of this magnitude. The arguments are often reasonable: too much comparing, too much emphasis, and too much teaching to the test. Whether true or false, it is important to remember these are merely a byproduct, and not the purpose, of the assessments.

The statewide assessment is intended to serve as a positive tool for schools and for the state. Tests scores can help schools identify areas for growth and areas of strength. It gives teachers feedback as to the effectiveness of their teaching. Scores give us a baseline that will allow us to track growth throughout the years. Ultimately, the scores serve as a tool for improvement. Transitioning into a statewide assessment will allow schools to compare apples to apples when looking at data.

It is my intention that parents and students understand the purpose of the tests. The tests serve as an accurate assessment of where we are while allowing us to speak a common language. As we move to statewide assessments, I hope that the students of Elgin are ready for the challenge. It is time to see the rewards of hard work and the product of years invested in learning. Assessments will take place for the different content areas beginning this month. I hope the assessments are viewed as an opportunity.

These are a few simple things students can do to ensure they have the best chance to show their knowledge through these tests:

Sleep at least eight (8) hours the night before the test.

Eat a protein as part of breakfast.

Do something active prior to the test.

We are getting close to that time of year - I hope we are ready to put our best foot forward!



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
