## AHEC GRANT FUNDS HEALTH CAREER SPEAKERS

For those students interested in entering the health care field, this year will be an informative and educational experience. Through an AHEC (Area Health Education Center) grant written by Barb Bode and Sara Walsh, many new opportunities will be available to the EHS students.
Initially, some of the grant money was spend to purchase a curriculum that will help to incorporate a health focus into many of the science classes. This will provide students with a real-life connection to the science material being taught, as well as set the stage for a possible future career.


The next
phase of the grant was to invite a "guest expert panel" to speak with the high school students interested in entering health care. The panel of speakers included recent Elgin High graduates who are currently in the educational phase of their health care preparation. Participants included

Whitney Sprout ('04), a senior majoring in pre-vet at UNL and currently applying to graduate schools; Stacy Hoefer ('04), a senior in the radiology program at St. Luke's through Briar Cliff University; Emily Vanis ('05), a junior majoring in pre-dentistry at Chadron State; and Chrissy Starman ('07) a freshman at Northeast Community College pursing a nursing degree. They spoke to about 20 high schoolers about their current training, what to expect when entering college as a health care major, and gave tips to the students regarding preparations they can make while still in high school.

Another focus of the grant was to bring in more speakers who currently work in a health science field. Dave Cinco, a nurse anesthetist at the Heart Hospital in Sioux Falls, SD was the speaker for January. He spoke of the education required to become an anesthesia provider, other nursing specialties, a description and requirements of the job, pay, and further opportunities within his job.

Other speakers lined up for the upcoming months include a medical technician, a genetics research computer programmer, and a research monitor for pharmaceutical drug testing. The grant will also cover future field trips to medical facilities.

## Plasma Cutter is Operational

The plasma cutter, stand, and computer have arrived and been installed! The excitement is building as students prepare to use the system. The CAD students are currently learning some background information about drafting and design. This requires a great deal of precision and visualization skills as they practice drawing 3-dimensional objects on 2-dimensional sheets of paper. Soon we'll be repeating the process with the AutoCAD program and then selecting projects to actually make using the plasma cutter system.

The Ag Mechanics class will also use the system to learn about automated cutting procedures and the Entrepreneurship class will use it design, build, and market products. This equipment will provide our students the opportunity to learn valuable skills they can apply in our high paced, technologically packed world.

## It's FAFSA Time!

If you're a college-bound senior, it's time to get serious about the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) the application for state, federal and college-specific financial aid. February is typically the time to apply as many colleges have a March 1 priority filing date. (Contact the colleges you applied to and ask about their priority date.) New tools will help you prepare EducationQuest has new online tools that will help you and your parents with the FAFSA.

- Guide to College Funding Video (coming soon!) - explains the types of financial aid and how to prepare for, and file, the FAFSA
- FAFSA Checklist - provides a comprehensive list of all documents you need to gather for the FAFSA
- FAFSA Tutorial - provides user-friendly clarification of each FAFSA question.

In addition to the tools listed above, your parents will receive a postcard from EducationQuest with FAFSA information.

## Follow these steps to complete the FAFSA...

## Step 1: Request a PIN

Request a Personal Identification Number (PIN) for you and one for a parent at www.pin.ed.gov. The PIN is your signature for the electronic FAFSA and is used to track your financial aid application.

## Step 2: File your taxes early

The FAFSA requires current tax information so complete your taxes early.

## Step 3: Gather these student and parent items:

- 2007 federal tax returns and, if applicable, Schedule K-1 (Form 1065)
- 2007 W-2 forms
- Student's driver's license number
- Social Security numbers
- Birth dates
- Date parents were married, separated, divorced or widowed
- Current cash, savings and checking account balances
- Current investment values (stocks, bonds, mutual funds, CDs, etc.) excluding retirement accounts

- Value of business or investment-farm
- 2007 child support (paid and/or received)
- 2007 ADC/TANF welfare benefits
- 2007 Social Security payments received from SSI or SSDI
- 2007 Workers' compensation
- Other untaxed income in 2007 such as veteran's benefits, housing/food/living allowances for military and clergy.
- Alien Registration Number for eligible non-citizens


## Step 4: Complete and file the FAFSA

Complete and file the FAFSA at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The colleges you list on the application will receive the results.

On Friday, Jan. $4^{\text {th }}$ Elgin hosted a four-team tournament. Austin recorded $1^{\text {st }}$ period pins in all three of his matches. He pinned T. Hart of Elkhorn Valley in 1:10, H. Jensen of Palmer in :56, and M. Shoop of Osmond in 1:16.

On Saturday Elgin hosted their invitational tournament. Austin placed $1^{\text {st }}$ while pinning all his opponents. He pinned D. Mendoza of Grand Island in :36, N. Schrunk of Aurora in 1:20, J. As a parent, daily communication with your child is essential. You have a great responsibility to stay informed as to what your child is doing both here at school and during times outside the regular school day. Most students, especially in grades 7-12 are extremely busy and constantly on the go making it much more difficult for parents and children to find the time to communicate with one another. One concern that is steadily becoming a real issue here at school is the amount of phone calls per day that come from parents wanting to talk with their child and the amount of calls from students here at school calling their parents at home or at work for non-emergency or non-essential matters. The concern here at the school is that this is becoming an increasing problem and causing some real distractions in some cases.

It is important that parents and students both make strong efforts to communicate openly with one another at home before and after school. Communicate plans for the day and for the week. Parents must spend the time at home to really involve yourself with what your child is doing. By not communicating in person, face to face, parents and students lose that opportunity to really listen and be involved. Communication with your child or with parents should not strictly be a matter of communicating to find out general information (game times, after school plans, how well you did on a test etc.), it is communicating to be involved and a part of what your child or family is doing.

It is also important to remember that when students call parents and the call is long distance, it is a cost to the district. Emergency or essential calls are understandable and not at all a problem. Office personnel will quickly assist students and parents in the event that they need to make an emergency or essential phone call or if a parents needs to be in contact with their child here at school. Many schools now document whom you are calling, the reason for the call (emergency/essential or non-emergency/nonessential), the number called and then charge that family for the call. When students use the school phone to call a parent, many times they are calling a cell phone number or work number that are not local numbers. This results in a cost to the district for each call. That does add up! Many times a parent will call wanting to have their child taken out of a class or study hall. When that student is summoned, the class or study hall is often disrupted resulting in a loss of class time for all students as a result of the distraction.

It must be noted that there needs to be a determination with students and parents between emergency/essential and non-emergency/non-essential. Sometimes, calling the schools to talk with a child is necessary and cannot be avoided. There is never a problem with that. Office personnel have been instructed to ask of the nature of in-coming calls so that they can make a determination as to is the interruption of a class is necessary. Notes can be delivered to students between classes and return calls can be made during lunch period as long as it did not become an everyday thing.

If parents and students make the efforts to communicate at home of the events of the day or week, fewer contacts will be necessary when students are in school. To me, it is just good ol' fashioned time spent as a family! Talk; look ahead at the week to come. It is my expectation that as the $2^{\text {nd }}$ semester continues, that there is a noticeable reduction in the number of non-essential phone calls being made to and from the school on a daily basis. Remember, as stated by John Powell, "Communication Works For Those Who Work At It".
