## TECHNOLOGY STUDENTS DESIGN ROBOTS

The Junior High Exploring with Technology students finished the semester with some great robot designs that illustrated what they learned. Some examples were cars that sensed walls and sound, catapult machines, a carnival game, and dogs that moved and sensed objects. This final project gave them the chance to really be creative and come up with their own original ideas. Though many found it difficult to build a robot without specific instructions, they were all up to the challenge and produced great results.

Rico Sanchez is a Disc Jockey who runs his service business as a proprietorship. Using this simulation packet, Accounting I students were responsible for completing all accounting work for the business, which reinforced the concepts learned during the first semester. The simulation packet provided all of the documents needed to complete all daily accounting transactions and month-end reports for the owner, which in turn allows an owner to evaluate if any changes are needed to be successful. The students also completed several end-of-fiscal- period reports for evaluation and had to summarize how the business is doing financially.

Currently, we are recording returns and discounts a business may use and will soon be learning how to complete all aspects of payroll. This will definitely help give them a clearer picture of taxes and will make them understand where all that money goes that comes out of their paychecks! The simulations we do in class are manual so the students will

Reading, reading, and more reading-that's what you'll find the English students of EPS doing these days. Whether it be 20Minute Read books or assigned texts for the classroom, the students have been dazzled by various great works by some talented authors.

At the beginning of the semester, the students were challenged to independently read more than four books a year (the number now required by our 20 Minute Read program). To this date, the majority of the students are well on their way to meeting and even surpassing their individual reading goals. ## GUIDELINES FOR KEEPING SICK CHILDREN HOME FROM SCHOOL

Each day, many parents are faced with a decision: should they keep their sick children at home or send them off to school? Often the way a child looks and acts can make the decision an obvious one. Keeping him home may protect him from
 further infection and avoid spreading the illness to other students. It also allows the child the opportunity to rest and recover.

The following guidelines should be considered when making the decision:
$>$ Fever - if your child's temperature is 100 degrees or higher, he should remain at home. The child can return to school after he/she has been fever free for 24 hours (without fever-reducing medicine such as Tylenol or Motrin).
> Diarrhea/Vomiting - a child with diarrhea and/or vomiting should stay at home and return to school only after being symptom free for 24 hours.
> Flu - If your child catches the flu, keep him/her home until symptoms (body aches, high fever, chills, congestion, sore throat and/or vomiting) subside.
$>\quad$ Conjunctivitis/Pink Eye - Following a diagnosis of pink eye, the child can return to school 24 hours after the first dose of prescribed medication or when a physician certifies him non-infectious.
> Mononucleosis - Keep at home until fever free and able to resume normal activities.
$>$ Strep Throat/Scarlet Fever - Your child is not contagious after he's been on physician-prescribed antibiotics for at least 24 hours.
$>$ Colds - Consider keeping your child at home if he/she is experiencing discomfort from cold symptoms, such as nasal congestion and cough. A continuous green discharge from the nose may be a sign of infection. Consider having the child seen by your health care provider.

## : Remember the three keys to preventing illness: <br> 1. Teach your child to wash his hands thoroughly and often and to use waterless hand cleanser when water isn't available. <br> 2. Give him disposable tissues; remind him to use and discard them. <br> 3. Discourage him from sharing food, plates, cups or utensils.

With winter officially arriving in late December, the chance of inclement weather is not far behind. When the weather is severe we are faced with the decision of closing school, starting late, or letting out early. This decision will be made as soon as possible. Our intention is to provide as much educational time as possible without endangering the safety of our students and staff.

If school or activities must be altered because of bad weather, we will send a message through our ALERTNOW telephone/e-mail notification system. Weather related starts will also be broadcast on the following radio stations: KBRX, US 92/KNEN, WJAG/KEXL, and KZ10o. Notice will also be announced on television stations KOLN/KGIN 10/11 and KLKN TV. This information will also be posted on the school website www.elgineagles.org.

With the colder weather make sure your child is dressed for the weather. Elementary students are taken outdoors for recess unless it is extremely cold. Being dressed and prepared for the cold weather is a definite necessity.

I also wanted to encourage and remind parents that if think you may qualify for Free or Reduced lunches to apply. You may apply at any time throughout the school and more than once. For instance, should you have submitted a form last fall and did not qualify or were approved at the reduced level, you may submit a new application. I strongly encourage you to apply if you have any changes in income or circumstances that would possibly make you eligible. Please contact us here at school if you have any questions.

Next fall begins a change in the age entrance requirement for kindergarten students. On March 17, 2010 Governor Heineman approved LB 1006 which with the 2012-13 school year states that, "...any school district shall not admit any child into the kindergarten of any school of such school district unless such child has reached the age of five years on or before July 31 of the calendar year in which the school year for which the child is seeking admission begins;". Prior to this the cut-off date for entrance into kindergarten was October $15^{\text {th }}$. Again the new cut-off date for kindergarten is July $33^{\text {sts }}$. If your student has NOT received the 2nd varicella vaccination, they need to receive the immunization AS SOON AS POSSIBLE to be in compliance with the State requirements. Please send the date they receive the immunization or that they had the disease to the school.

You may also schedule an appointment with your local physician to receive immunizations.
