## Responsibilities of the Spectator

1. Show interest in the contest by enthusiastically cheering and applauding the performance of both teams.
2. Show proper respect for opening ceremonies by standing at attention and remaining silent when the National Anthem is played.
3. Understand that a ticket is a privilege to observe the contest, not a license to verbally attack others, or to be obnoxious. Maintain self-control.
4. Do no "boo," stamp feet or make disrespectful remarks toward players or officials.
5. Learn the rules of the game, so that you may understand and appreciate why certain situations take place.
6. Know that noisemakers of any kind are not proper for indoor events.
7. Obey and respect officials and faculty supervisors who are responsible for keeping order. Respect the integrity and judgment of game officials.
8. Stay off the playing area at all times.
9. Do not disturb others by throwing material onto the playing area.
10. Show respect for officials, coaches, cheerleaders and student-athletes.
11. Pay attention to the half time program and do not disturb those who are watching.
12. Respect public property by not damaging the equipment or the facility.
13. Know that the school officials reserve the right to refuse attendance of individuals whose conduct is not proper.
14. Refrain from the use of alcohol and drugs on the site of the contest.

Seniors...it's time to start the admissions process!
College may still seem far off, but admission deadlines will start hitting this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track? Contact your top college choices NOW and ask about deadlines and the process for applying for admission, college-based scholarships and financial aid. Also, ask about application fees. This information may also be available in the College Profiles section at www.educationquest.org.
Apply to your top 3-4 colleges before the deadline. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay and an interview.
Update your Activities Resume. Because extracurricular activities are an important part of the admissions application, keep them up-to-date by using the Activities Resume at www.educationquest.org. In many cases, you can simply print your resume and include it with the application.
Contact your admissions representative periodically to stay informed about deadlines and campus activities.

## Juniors...start researching colleges

If you can narrow your choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful. Here's how to get started:
Review College Profiles at www.educationquest.org for information about Midwest colleges. If you're interested in going to an out-of-state school, check out the Midwest Student Exchange Program at http://msep.mhec.org.
Visit an EducationQuest location in Lincoln, Kearney or Omaha and use our free college search resources.
Meet with college representatives who visit your school.

# Being a Discriminating Consumer 



The idea of being a discriminating consumer is hardly new. There are entire magazines devoted to helping consumers pick just the right product. Go online and one can find the book price and value of almost any new or used vehicle. Consumers are used to price shopping at the department store and the grocery.

There is a very important place, however, where consumers may not be doing as good a job. How effective and discriminating are voters when faced with the choices at the voting booth? Thomas Jefferson strongly believed that our form of government and indeed our way of life depended on an educated citizenry. Yet, we are living in a world in which democracy is under serious attack, both at home and abroad.

Just consider the questions that we have been bombarded with over the past month or so. Is the United States to blame for the rising level of Muslim Jihadism? Why does so much of the world hate us? What types of rights should the terrorists now held at Guantonimo Bay be given? More closely at home are the questions about which candidate will be best for governor. Whom do we want to elect to replace Tom Osborne? What initiatives deserve to be passed and which ones should be buried so deeply they never see the light of Nebraska politics again.

The only way we can do justice to this election season is to follow Jefferson's advice: We must educate ourselves. Now, this means more than turning on the television and listening to attack ad after attack ad. None of these types of advertisements really tell us what we need to know as we go to the polls in a few days.
If, you haven't already done so, now is the time to dig out the newspaper that explains what each initiative will do. Take the time to study the effects of the initiative if passed. Are the effects what you want to live with, for your children to live with and even your grandchildren? Will it make our state a better more progressive place that will be attractive to live in? Which candidate will be the best spokesperson for our needs and interests?

This is democracy in action, and we need to be modeling it for our young people. We need to model it by thoughtfully selecting our leaders at the local, county, state, and national levels. We need to model it by being able to knowledgeably discuss the initiatives and Constitutional Amendments that are on the ballot this fall. Most of all, we need to model it by taking the time to vote. It is embarrassing that such a small percentage of eligible voters take the time to cast their ballots on election day.

So, I urge you: Study the issues, know the positive and negative effects of each initiative and Constitutional Amendment; then, go and vote! In this way, we can model democracy and pass a better Nebraska down to our children and grandchildren.

FOR EDUCATION

What a weird fall season. Warm weather, arctic fronts, rain, and snow and let us not forget about that wind! This fall season has put a big exclamation point on the old saying: "If you don't like the weather in Nebraska...wait 10 minutes!" I guess we will take whatever Mother Nature sends us.

I have been addressed on several occasions about the concern that our staff is grading too soft or that our focus has shifted to looking good in the eyes of the public and not necessarily preparing our kids for success beyond their secondary education. This was certainly a shock for me as for the most part, I have spent some time the past couple of years addressing questions and concerns referring to how the USDE (United States Department of Education), the NDE (Nebraska Department of Education) and our local board, administration and staff has made education so difficult. As with most issues regarding education, there are always two viewpoints depending on whom you are talking to, or which 10 minutes of Nebraska weather you are currently enduring...just kidding. Seldom do I have parents and students come to the office complaining that things are just too darn easy!

The best way to respond to this concern is to look at the recent and past directions of those who have graduated from our school system. I hang my hat on the fact that our students have the opportunity to graduate these days from Elgin Public Schools with as many as 17-20 college credit hours completed before they begin their first day on a college campus. Our staff is dedicated in providing an education that is based on the principles of accountability, meaning that students must earn success. The philosophy here is that grades are earned. They are not given. Students do as well as or as poorly as they choose to do. If you are doing well, you have earned it. If you are doing poorly, it is most often a result of choices that are being made by the student. There are students that have learning difficulties. We work hard to meet the needs of students who need to have accommodations. Still, the belief at Elgin Public Schools is that there should still be a high degree of accountability for all students.

Students whom are accountable for their learning will accept the challenges posed by our curriculum and the state standards. They will succeed. This is not just a high school way of thinking. Our elementary students are also held accountable. We believe that it is never too early to instill the value of accountability. Students who understand the importance of high expectations and develop the work ethic to meet those expectations are more apt to place academics as a priority and enjoy success, even as an elementary student. At the high school level, our ACT scores continue to be equal to or higher than the state average on a regular basis. The majority of graduates from Elgin Public Schools will go on and attend a post-secondary institution and continue their education.

Getting back to the concern that was addressed earlier. Our teachers have a responsibility to all of our students. They must prepare these kids for life after elementary and high school. They do not take that responsibility lightly. Over $3 / 4$ of the teaching staff at Elgin Public Schools has earned their Masters Degree. I heard a comment made years ago that a Masters Degree only means that you are an educated moron. While I cannot speak for all educators who have earned their Masters or other degrees and endorsements, I think I can speak for our staff here. They are good at what they do and they understand how to deliver the kind of education needed to succeed in our society. I would never consider them as a group of individuals making it easy. Earning an A here is not an easy thing to do.

Every school is different to a certain degree. Every school has its strengths and weaknesses; positive supporters and nay- sayers looking to find fault in everything they do. I believe that small schools in small communities have an advantage in many ways and a disadvantage in others. One thing is for sure. If you are looking for an easy way to graduate or a place where there is a low expectation and a lack for student accountability...Elgin Public Schools is not the place! We are constantly looking for ways to improve what we do. We rely on graduates to provide insight as to what we need to do for our students. At the elementary level, we must stay focused to what the scores of our kids tell us. What areas need more focus and how can we become better. We must be constantly looking for ways to better an already excellent education.
