Now you can find out online!
We have purchased the Wordware Web-Email module to add to our Lunch Cashier System. This module will automatically send emails to families with low balances and update our website with account balance information for parents to securely view.

Over 60 percent of families now have email and Internet access from their homes or their work places.
Elgin Public Schools will soon be able to take advantage of this low-cost and reliable communications avenue to alert our families electronically to low-balances in family meal accounts. Additionally you will be able to access your current account information online-anytime.
Specifics on the Web-Email module are as follows:
$\Rightarrow$ Printed Letter Statements will be replaced with emails, for families that have supplied the school with an email address and release form. E-mails can only be sent to those who have a signed release form on file.
$\Rightarrow$ Emails are processed and sent out at 6:00 p.m. each evening
$\Rightarrow$ This is a secure site; only specific personnel with the correct user-ID and two specific passwords may access this information
$\Rightarrow$ Families must know their family ID and PIN to access family account information. Your family ID appears on the printed statements. The school will provide you with a PIN, or you can request that a different one be used. If you do not know your family lunch account ID, please call the school.
If you would like to receive an email statement, please sign and return the email release form you received in the mail. You may simply return the release form with your child or through the mail. Please put attention Andrea on it.

## JUNIOR MATH GOALS

Math on-line assessments have begun. These tests are reported electronically to the state to assess how our students are performing. The following items are the STARS assessment that must be reported.
12.2.1 Students will solve theoretical and applied problems using numbers in equivalent forms, radicals, exponents, scientific notation, absolute values, fractions, decimals, and percents, ratios and proportions, order of operations, and properties of real numbers.
12.4.1 Students will calculate perimeter and area of two-dimensional shapes and surface area and volume of threedimensional shapes.
12.4.6 Students will apply geometric properties to solve problems.
12.5.1 Students will select a sampling technique to gather data, analyze the resulting data, and make inferences.
12.5.3 Students will interpret theoretical probability to represent problems, solve problems, and make informal decisions.
12.6.1 Students will graph and interpret algebraic relations and inequalities.
12.6.2 Students will apply and solve problems involving equations and inequalities.

Students are allowed one re-take of an on-line assessment if the standard was not mastered the first time. As sophomores, they took 12.4.1 and 12.4.6 since these assessments are primary about Geometry. The rest of the assessments were introduced in either Math 8 or Algebra I. Some assessments were expanded on in Geometry. Finally, in Algebra 2, the assessments are mastered and tested! Good luck to the class of 2009!

Seniors...it's time to start the admissions process!
College may still seem far off, but admission deadlines will start hitting this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track:


Contact your top college choices NOW and ask about deadlines and the process for applying for admission, college-based scholarships and financial aid.

Apply to your top 3-4 colleges before the deadline. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay and an interview.

Update your Activities Resume. Because extracurricular activities are an important part of the admissions application, keep them up-to-date by using the Activities Resume at www.educationquest.org. In many cases, you can simply print your resume and include it with the application.

Contact your admissions representative periodically to stay informed about deadlines and campus activities.

## Attend a Financial Aid Program to learn college funding options

Juniors and seniors - to learn about financial aid and other college funding options, attend an upcoming Financial Aid Program with your parents or an adult who can help you with college planning. To find the date and location of the program at your school or in your area, ask your guidance counselor or see the Upcoming Events section at www.educationquest.org.

Juniors...start researching colleges
If you can narrow your choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful. Here's how to get started:
Review College Profiles at www.educationquest.org for information about Midwest colleges. If you're interested in going to an out-of-state school, check out the Midwest Student Exchange Program at http://msep.mhec.org.
Visit an EducationQuest location in Lincoln, Kearney or Omaha and use our free college search resources.
Meet with college representatives who visit your school.
Once you've narrowed your choices, schedule campus visits. Try to visit in the spring of your junior year while college classes are still in session.

The class learned about how the landscape around us can change both slowly and quickly. The students loved the volcano and took home a recipe on how to make their own volcano at home.

## Superintendent's Goal: Reading



Several months ago I addressed the goal that the board and I set for the area of technology. This month I would like to address the goal we set in the area of reading. Elgin Public School wants ALL students reading on grade level by the end of their third grade year.

Now this may seem like an easy goal to reach but it really isn't. In the typical third grade classroom a teacher will have approximately five levels of readers: Those that are reading well above grade level, those reading slightly above grade level, students reading right on grade level, students reading slightly below grade level and finally those reading well below grade level. The research on reading achievement has found definite evidence to show that students reading on grade level by the end of third grade are programmed for academic success while those reading below grade level will continually struggle with academics and those significantly below grade level will have major struggles with their academic workload.

Now do not misunderstand, Elgin Public Elementary staff has always done an excellent job of teaching reading. But, students are changing and so is reading methodology. After monitoring our students closely with the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Learning Skills (DIBELS) we determined that we should implement a different basic reading program in our school. Therefore, this year we began the Reading Mastery program. Reading Mastery's difference lies in the fact each student is given a diagnostic reading test to determine their correct level of instruction. They are then put into a small group of students that are working at that same instructional level. An elementary teacher is assigned to their group. The teacher may have a paraprofessional working with her and the paraprofessional may also work with a group of students. The program is one of direct instruction and very fast paced. Students have to stay on task, and there is no room to hide errors. Since the children are working in small groups it is easier for the teacher to know immediately when a students is not getting a concept and responding incorrectly.

In addition to investing in new reading materials, the Northern Tier Schools contracted with Educational Resources Incorporated to provide instructional coaches in the use of Reading Mastery. We had our first session with the instructional coach, Pricilla Brown, the last week in September. As a coach, Ms. Brown's job is to watch the teacher teaching and then to offer suggestions on how improvement can be made in the lesson delivery. While Ms. Brown found that our instructional staff was doing an overall good job implementing the program, she had some suggestions to make the sessions even more productive. Finally, she worked with students we had questions about and suggested placement at their level of performance.

The progress monitoring that the teachers are doing with the students is very encouraging. Students are showing steady gain as they work through the reading lessons. Some students who have been struggling readers are also feeling more confident in their reading skill, "I'm getting to be a better reader. I can tell!" one young student assured me. That's what I want to hear and such a feeling of achievement is why we chose this program and invested in professional reading coaches.

November $11^{\text {th }}$ is the day we celebrate Veterans Day. I look forward to this day each year. The schools come together to observe this day and participate in the annual Veterans Day program held each year in the Elgin Public Gymnasium (this year it will be on November $8^{\text {th }}$ due to the weekend so that all can attend from both schools and the community). I believe that of all of the things that we do throughout the school year, this program is the most important. It is important for several reasons. First, no one can be allowed to forget the cost for our freedoms. I believe we have a responsibility in schools to not only teach about our history, but to also celebrate it. The veterans who come to this program each year all have stories to tell of their time serving our country and for some, those stories are difficult to share. Still, their faces show that they are proud to have been a part of defending our freedoms. I often think back to the day when I wondered about where some of them would end up. Some have been a great surprise and some you just knew they would make an impact. I am sure some of their folks would agree. Jim Score, Mike Schmitt and Troy Moore, to name only a few that I have taught, are currently or have recently been engaged in the war in the Middle East. To hear of their experiences and what they have or are currently enduring makes me feel very proud of them. The common characteristic that I see among these young men and those men and women who served in the past is that they are very humble people. They do not seek major recognition and praise. If you ask them, they will most likely tell you that they were simply doing their job. We all know it is and was more than just a job.

Make plans to join us at Elgin Public School on Thursday, November $8^{\text {th }}$ at 11:00 a.m. as we celebrate both current and past service men and women. It is always a great program and an opportunity to say Thank You to those who have given of themselves for the freedoms we enjoy today.
