# Counselor's Corner 

## Seniors...it's time to start the admissions process!

College may still seem far off, but admission deadlines will start hitting this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track:
Contact your top college choices NOW and ask about deadlines and the process for applying for admission, collegebased scholarships and financial aid.

Apply to your top 3-4 colleges before the deadline. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay and an interview.

Update your Activities Resume. Because extracurricular activities are an important part of the admissions application, keep them up-to-date by using the Activities Resume at EducationQuest.org. In many cases, you can simply print your resume and include it with the application.

Contact your admissions representative periodically to stay informed about deadlines and campus activities.

## Attend a Financial Aid Program to learn college funding options

Juniors and seniors - to learn about financial aid and other college funding options, attend an upcoming Financial Aid Program with your parents or an adult who can help you with college planning. To find the date and location of the program at your school or in your area, ask your guidance counselor or see the Upcoming Events section at EducationQuest.org.

## Juniors...start researching colleges

If you can narrow your choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful. Here's how to get started:

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## EXPECTED YOUTH BEHAVIOR AT SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

When attending games or other activities, you are there to watch and cheer for those participating. All children who attend games should be there to watch the game and act in a controlled manner. Parents must remember that they assume responsibility for their children. With so many vehicles parking around the gym during home games and activities and around the football field facility during games, there is a real concern when youth are playing and running around. Please make an effort to address this issue with your child. When you go to games with your child, make sure he/she knows what is expected. Keep an eye on what they are doing AT ALL TIMES. If you allow your child to attend games unattended, they should be well versed in how they are expected to act. The same also holds true for attending games at other schools. It is important to remember that the same expectations should apply no matter where you are attending.

There is nothing more frustrating that to attend a game and be constantly distracted by children who are running around. By taking the time to address this issue at home, we can all attend games and activities and enjoy the efforts of our student-athletes.

A few key points to address with your child at home...
$\Rightarrow$ You are there to watch the game and not run around
$\Rightarrow$ Do not play under bleachers
$\Rightarrow$ Do not run in gym hallways and commons areas
$\Rightarrow$ Use restrooms only when needed
$\Rightarrow$ Do not push or pull constantly on restraining cables or fences
$\Rightarrow$ Cheer for those playing the games
$\Rightarrow$ When attending concerts or other non-athletic events, be courteous to those who are performing... stay for the entire program and do not run around and distract those who are trying to watch

I spent the evenings this fall reading and researching educational issues. There are so many things I could share with you. There were a couple of very interesting themes being bounced around and I am going to share some.

One that I related to the most was a quote from the Reverend R. Inman who stated, "A great teacher never strives to explain his vision-he simply invites you to stand beside him and see for yourself." What a great statement to think about as you spend time with your children. If we could only get the children to see what we want for them to see or what they need to see. You as a parent are the eyes of the future generations of Americans. I have an unwavering belief in you as parents and in our staff and know that we have the ability to do just that, be the eyes and visionaries for our students. The second quote is from Denis Waitley and says, " The greatest gift we can give children is the roots of responsibility and the wings of independence." We as adults and especially parents are in a position to do just that.

I would like to take just a few lines to reflect on the two quotes from above and put some personal thoughts into the matter. We as educators and you as parents are in an unique position that allows us to direct the development of the future of our country. Let me suggest the following thoughts on how to become that visionary and nurturing parent.
*Be there for your children. Come to school, meet their teachers, check on their homework, show up as much as you can. Take them camping or to a movie. Show them that you are interested in their hobbies and music.
*Let your children know you love them. No matter what they do they need to know that you love them. You can tell them that you are not fond of some of the decisions that they are making but that it does not mean you care for them less. Your children should always feel secure in the knowledge that they are loved.
*Let them risk as failure is the mother of necessity. Let them venture, they will fail (everyone does) so you must help them up and encourage them to start again. Do not blame failure on anyone, use it as a teaching situation. You can help them by structuring the types of risks that they will take.

Find some common ground and find things that you can do together. Hunting, fishing, cooking, quilting, board games, boy scouts, church activities and things that the family can do together. (Their family is common ground!)
*Be honest because sharing the truth is so very important. Never tell them one thing and do another. Let them know if there is a problem. Trying to hide issues from children who are old enough to understand most likely will result in more problems. Honesty takes the gray area out of all situations. Discuss important issues with them, talk about sex and drugs and appropriate choices. Do not promise if you cannot deliver.
*Share responsibility from the early years until your children are long gone it is appropriate to give them responsibilities. Younger children love to help with the trash or dishes as long as you are there with them. It is not so easy for them to enjoy it if you are sitting around watching TV and asking them to go do this and that. There is little that children will not do if they have the opportunity to work along side of their parents.
*Be a role model by living the way that you want your children to live. Be a "do as I do and not a do as I say" parent. Be proud of what you do because I know that your children want to be. Make it easy for them to say,"that is my dad or mom".
*Discipline with dignity by always punishing the crime, do not make big deals out of little ones and always punish individually. Treat each child as an individual, do not say Betty does it that way or why can't you be as good as Timmy. Each child is different and it is your role as the parent to support and punish each child fairly and with the individual child in mind.

Build an expectation for your children and do what it takes to show them why you have that expectation. As quoted above that we need to stand there with them and direct them in a direction that is appropriate for everyone. We need to give them the freedoms to grow and the path that will help to make them successful and understanding of their places in the total picture of things. I know that all of you have your ideas on what is successful means and that all of you have seen these ideas before but as stated previously what a great picture it paints for our children.

From the office of the Superintendent there are some things that I would like to have you parents do if you have concerns or comments to make. If everyone would follow the chain of command and visit with the staff, administration, and the board with your concerns in that order it will help us to realize and act upon your thoughts quickly and in an informed manner.

There is absolutely nothing in life as important as our children and together we can work no insuring a successful year for all involved.
Hope to see you all at school during the course of the year. My door is always open and we always have time for those interested in what is best for their children. We may not always agree on what is best but we are truly interested in your ideas.

Growing up, I had really only one ambition and that was to farm. The vision I had of my life after high school was pretty simplistic, as is the case with most youth at that age. My plans included going to a 2 -year tech school, earn a degree in an agriculture related field and then return home as soon as possible and farm. To me, nothing else was really ever a serious interest. I enjoyed showing livestock year-round and spending time in the fields. As I progressed through high school, I seldom thought of other careers and I believed that I would grow old in the same community in which I was raised and live "the good life" farming. I even had it sort of planned in my mind how I would just "take over" my grandfathers farm since he would be about retirement age when I was finished with college. Not too sure if my grandfather felt the same way but it was my vision nevertheless. It all seemed so easy and just made sense. I think a lot of high school age kids are just like me and think as I thought back then. They see their futures through rose colored glasses just as I did and unless someone really takes the time to talk to them, their vision remains more fantasy then reality.

It was early my junior year in high school when my parents really started to talk with me about what I was planning to do. My high school guidance counselor also worked hard to educate students about college and to encourage students to think of the bigger picture and look farther beyond the next couple of years. It was along about that time that my dad shared with me his thoughts on my future and he made some really good points. He explained that farming was a great living... and I agree that it most certainly was and still is today. While farming meant a lot of uncertainties it was what my dad enjoyed doing. (I do remember the mid-to-late 80 's and the banking debacle that put a lot of families out of the farming business). He shared with me that it was good to have a dream and that if I chose to farm, then great, he and my mother would support me $100 \%$. However, he also encouraged me to explore other careers and to look at the opportunities that maybe I had not thought of. My teachers in high school may have told you that for me and my attitude, just making it through high school may be a stretch. I swear a few of them would have bet their life savings had they been told I would eventually have a career in education. What's more is that most would have keeled over on the spot had you told them I would someday work as a high school principal. Still, I took the advice of my parents and my guidance counselor seriously (not sure why but I am glad that I did). If you knew me then, taking anything seriously took an act of congress so to say that I took my future seriously at that time was a real change of behavior. Those discussions and the encouragement from my parents and teachers made a difference. Looking back, I am not sure how things would have turned out had all involved not taken the time to push me to think beyond the present at that time.

My point is that we do not live in the same kind of world as we did when I was going to school 16 years ago. Our students must start thinking about their futures and the opportunities that are out there now and not wait until they are ready to graduate. Now, more than ever, students have to have at least given their future some thought and have a preliminary plan when they leave high school. Now, I am not saying that you have to have things locked in place. Definitely not! We still have the freedoms to choose our futures for ourselves. No matter our age, as long as we have prepared ourselves and put ourselves in a position to be able to be selective in our decisions, those freedoms do apply.

I graduated from high school with little idea as to exactly what I wanted to do. However, had it not been for the guidance of those at school AND that of my parents, I would have not really ever considered what the possibilities were. I hope all of you parents are taking the time to communicate with your child about their futures. Perhaps nothing you discuss will be as important and for those parents of seniors...time is running out! As one of my favorite quotes states, "failing to plan is planning to fail!" Nothing could be more true.
