## Counselor's Corner

## Seniors...have you visited your top colleges?

If you haven't done so already, visit your top college choices soon as application deadlines will start hitting this fall. Follow these tips for a successful visit:

Contact the admissions office at least two weeks in advance to schedule your visit. Make appointments with an admissions representative, financial aid counselor and a faculty member in the area of study that interests you.

Check out the college website before your visit. Most college sites have a section for prospective students where you can learn about the school's admissions process, types of majors, student services and employment opportunities. You might even be able to schedule your visit online.

Visit while school is in session. You won't get the true flavor during breaks or finals week.
Get a feel for the campus. Hang out in the student union, find coffee shops with wireless Internet access, eat in a restaurant close to campus or attend athletic or cultural events.

Ask LOTS of questions. See the EducationQuest College Prep Handbook or website for good questions to ask.

## Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

- Don't pay for scholarship searches! Use free search sites including ScholarshipQuest at www.educationquest.org that lists over 1,600 state and local awards. Check out free national sites such as FastWeb, SRN Express and FastAid. Scholarship resources are also available at your local library and at the EducationQuest offices in Kearney, Lincoln and Omaha.
- Visit your guidance counselor weekly for information about local scholarships.
- Get organized. Place scholarship applications in deadline order and prioritize each award. Local and college-specific scholarships deserve top priority because you're more likely to earn them.
- Continually update your activities, honors and volunteer or paid jobs using the Activities Resume at www.educationquest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline.
- Get an early start on essays. Describe your interests, hopes for the future and leadership abilities - but be sure to tailor your essay to the scholarship topic.
- Pay close attention to grammar, spelling and neatness. Ask at least two people to proofread your application.

## Whole Faculty Study Groups



Last July a group of Elgin educators was trained in using faculty study groups to effect student academic gains. "The WholeFaculty Study Group system is a job-embedded, self-directed, student-driven approach to professional development," states Carlene Murphy the developer of the approach. Every faculty member is involved and all of their study revolves around the following guiding questions.

What do students need for teachers to do so that teachers will have a deeper understanding of what they teach?
What do students need for teachers to do so that teachers will be more skillful in how they teach?
What do students need for teachers to do so that teachers will challenge students to learn difficult and fundamental concepts?
What do students need for teachers to do so that the teachers will give students skills to be deep thinkers and problem solvers?
In August the group that attended the summer training introduced the process to the rest of the staff. After the initial training staff members decided what area of the curriculum they wanted to study. This determined the study group they were in. The Elgin staff has chosen the following questions to study for the remainder of this year:

What can we do to improve our students' understanding of scientific topics and their application? (Mrs. Heilhecker, Ms. Johnson, Mrs. Walsh, Mr. Eisenhauer and Mr. Simpson)
How can we teach students to comprehend what they read? (Mrs. Beckman, Mrs. Zwingman, Mrs. Vanis, Mrs. Miller and Mrs. Simpson--elementary) (Mrs. Newcomb, Miss Meyers and Mrs. Jones--secondary)
What can we do in our classroom to assist students in decoding and reading fluency? (Mrs. Eisenhauer, Mrs. Gunderson, Mrs. Jochum, Mrs. Lierman and Mrs. Score)
How can we improve student spelling and writing? (Mrs. Thorberg, Mr. Wells, Mrs. Siems and Miss Davis)
How do we motivate students to become an active, positive citizen in today's society? (Mr. Jones, Mrs. Heithoff and Mrs. Butterfield)


As you can tell by reading the questions each team has chosen to study these are vital issues for any student's development. The teams were able to determine the essential question they wish to address and are now working on conducting the research into the problem and selecting interventions to use on the problem.

Karl Clauset a leader from the Whole Faculty Study Group and Alice Senseny from the Nebraska Department of Education were in Elgin Monday morning, September 24 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, to visit with a representative from each group about the work so far. Questions about the process and the work were addressed.

The groups will continue to meet for approximately one hour twice a month as they study the problem, view student work and plan interventions and strategies. The groups will be reporting periodically to the Curriculum Coordinating Council about their progress. I look forward to hearing great things from these groups.

The leaves are turning colors and falling from trees, the harvest season is underway for most farmers and the cooler weather has brought a subtle calm to the Sandhills. Fall is certainly here and for me, it is really one of my favorite times of the year. I am excited about the way our school year has started. Although we have endured some events that have been tragic and difficult, the students and staff really are to be commended for their positive approach to the school year.

Elgin Public Schools celebrated Homecoming this year during the week of September $10^{\text {th }}-14^{\text {th }}$. It was a week full of fun, excitement and a lot of school spirit and pride. Both the volleyball and football teams were successful and I believe the students enjoyed the experience. We even had a rare appearance by the ol' Elgin Eagle mascot during the parade! Congratulations to the entire homecoming royalty court and to King Matthew Anderson and to Queen Alisha Anderson. I would like to extend a big thank you to Jeanine Jochum who always does a great job preparing the pep rallies for the bonfire and following the parade. Also, thanks to the Elgin fire department and those volunteers for being on hand to help with the bonfire. Thanks to all of our staff and community for all you do during homecoming and throughout the school year. It is not possible to host these kinds of activities for our students without all of your help.

I would like to take the opportunity and touch on an issue that is growing nation wide and one that I am going to make a strong effort to address this school year. Cellular phone use is, for a lack of better words, OUT OF CONTROL! I am simply blown away as to how many kids have a cell phone. Students, even in the elementary school, are being given cell phones. Now, I realize that cell phones allow people to be more efficient in their approach to everyday living. They provide added security for individuals traveling and it does make it easier to communicate. The problem is, there are also a lot of negatives that are happening with youth using these phones for reasons that are not what they were intended for. Camera phones are being used to take pictures and then those pictures are downloaded to the Internet. Students have been found to use the phones in classes to take a picture of an exam and send it to classmates. Text Messaging is a real issue in schools across the country. Students can communicate with others in or outside of school and classrooms without saying a word. This growing problem is a nation wide concern in almost all schools. I do have a cellular phone. However, I do not keep it on my person at school. It is always shut off and in a secure place. Our teachers also have expectations for cellular phone use and consequences are and have been enforced if used inappropriately.

Parents and students must realize that there is no need for students to carry their cell phone with them to a class. There is a student phone that is available to all students right outside my office and with permission they can use that phone anytime during the day. There have been examples at EHS of parents contacting their child via voice mail or text messaging during class. It is impossible to ask students to follow the rules if parents are willing to violate policy, as well. I do not believe there is any reason for a student to carry a cell phone during the regular school day. School Board policy (504.12) is very clear of the expected use of cellular phones and communications devices. The issue is addressed at the beginning of each school year with parents and students in grades 7-12. At the beginning of the school year, students and parents sign the handbook agreement forms stating that they agree to abide by the policies and rules of the school. Therefore, it is my understanding that the school should make every attempt to enforce the policies that are in place.

I would like to ask all parents to assist me as we work to address this issue. As I wrote last month, we do live in a different kind of world than we did 15-20 years ago. Not that it is always a bad thing, but definitely different! Technology is easier to access and more affordable. Again, that can be both good and/or bad depending on what technology is used for. When used appropriately, technology can be very valuable for people of all ages. When used inappropriately, it can and does cause many problems and on occasion, can result in legal issues students and parents then have to address. To me it is pretty simple. Shut the phones off and place them in the locker when you get to school and take them with you at the end of the day. Thank you in advance for your active support in helping to eliminate this growing problem.
