Go Green!

In the spring of 2008, many students at Elgin Public had a concern that they discussed with Mrs. Walsh. The issue was that our school was throwing away too many items that could be recycled. In light of this concern, EPS began a school-wide recycling pro-

gram. From its humble beginnings as an Environmental Science class project, it has flourished into a school-wide effort to increase awareness and involvement at all levels; everyone from K-12 students to staff have been involved in helping to decrease the amount of landfill space taken up by our activities here at school. The EPS recycling program is currently focused on recycling aluminum and paper products (including cardboard, magazines, chipboard, etc). We hope to reinstate the plastic recycling this year as well. In the 2008-09 school-year, we recycled over 200 lbs of aluminum and 12.12 **tons** of paper products. And since GreenFiber pays us for our paper product recycling, we have earned \$242.40! This money has been put towards better recycling equipment in the school and completing school beautification projects.

Though we do not regularly collect recyclable materials from residents, we encourage that everyone continues to recycle at home as well. We are lucky to have a recycling facility conveniently located downtown for anyone to use.

My Child Is Absent-Does the School Need a Note?

It is very important that the school knows the whereabouts of all the students during the school day. Parents should call the school (843-2455) right away in the morning to tell us that your child is sick or has an appointment, but we should still receive a handwritten note from the parent when the child returns to school. All notes are filed in the student's file for the entire year. If there is ever a question about an absence that is reported on Schoolmaster, we have that note to verify the information.

Throughout the school year the North Central District Health Dept. does a weekly surveillance with schools. School surveillance is a state-wide effort that is used for early recognition of disease outbreaks throughout Nebraska in order to treat the diseases, such as influenza, promptly and stop the spread of the disease as quickly as possible. It is important to remember, when you call the school to let them know your child is ill, please let them know what symptoms your child is experiencing. This information is very beneficial in tracking different types of illnesses.

The College Fair, sponsored by EducationQuest Foundation and the Nebraska Association of College Registrars and Admissions Officers, will also feature financial aid presentations in the Auditorium.

Follow these tips to help you make the most of your College Fair visit:

- * Before you attend, determine which colleges you want to visit (<u>a list is available</u> in the College Fair article at educationquest.org).
- * **Prepare a list of questions** to ask the college representatives. Ask about deadlines for admission, scholarships and financial aid.
- * **Prepare pre-printed labels** with your name and address to stick on information cards at college booths where you want additional information.
- Attend a financial aid program at the College Fair to learn about types of aid and how to apply.

Educational Planning Programs feature "mini college fairs"

If you can't make it to a College Fair, attend an Educational Planning Program at a school in your area (see <u>Upcoming</u> <u>Events</u> at **EducationQuest.org** for dates and locations). These "mini college fairs" feature representatives from state and regional colleges along with college planning and financial aid information.

The importance of getting involved!

Start the school year by getting involved in extracurricular activities to increase your chances for scholarships and admission to your top colleges. Use the <u>Activities Resume</u> at **EducationQuest.org** to track your involvement throughout high school – then the information is readily available when it's time to apply.

Senior students and parents...start preparing for college admission!

College may still seem far off, but admission deadlines will start hitting later this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track:

- 1. Contact your top colleges NOW and ask about application deadlines for admission, college-based scholarships and financial aid. Ask if you need a separate application for scholarships, and about application fees.
- **2. Visit with college representatives** at College Fairs, Educational Planning Programs, during campus visits, and when they visit your high school.
- **3.** Apply to your top **3-4 colleges before the deadline**. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay and an interview.



MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD ATTENDS SCHOOL DAILY

As the school year begins, help your child get into the habit of going to school every day.

Research shows that missing school regularly can hurt both the students who miss class—and their classmates.

When students miss school, they miss out on learning. When they return, they have to work harder to catch up. After a while, it gets more difficult to catch up, and then kids are even more likely to miss school.

As a result, kids who miss school have lower levels of achievement throughout their school careers. By sixth grade, research shows that students who miss an average of just one day a week are more likely to drop out of high school.

The students who do come to class also miss out. When teachers have to repeat material or pay extra attention to kids who have been absent, everyone suffers.

Have you "Gone Green"

Many families are doing their part to try and help the environment. Some recycle. Others use compact fluorescent light bulbs. And still others try to

take public transportation as much as possible.

This school year, give your teen the chance to do something good for the environment. Help him try to turn his homework "green" by saving paper. Encourage your teen to:

- Get creative with notes. Your teen could take notes on the back of old papers that are blank on one side. Or he could record class discussions and type up notes at home on the computer.
- Use recycled notebook paper. Using recycled paper can save a huge amount of landfill space each year! Just have your teen look on the packaging of the paper. If it's recycled, it will say so right on the package.
- Think before printing. Does your teen really need to print out each draft of his research paper? See if he can edit earlier drafts right on the computer and only print when necessary. And he should use the front and the back of paper when he does print!

Help your daughter avoid peer pressure to send, post pictures

Teens who are staring at their cell phones may not be reading text messages. They may be looking at suggestive photos forwarded by friends. New research shows that peer pressure can cause girls to email these suggestive pictures. Almost half of teens say that pressure from friends or

dates is the reason girls post photos they would never share with their grandparents!

Here is a talk you must have with your teen—before she pushes the "send" button:

- **Know who your teen** communicates with. You know who comes into your home, but do you know who your teen is communicating with on her phone and online?
- Be sure your teen understands that *nothing* is private in cyberspace. Even when teens think they're sending a photo to just a few friends, those teens forward the pictures and pretty soon, they are on MySpace.
- **Help her think about the future.** Nothing completely disappears once it's on the Internet. How will she feel if a college admissions officer sees the picture? How about a potential employer?
- Check out your teen's online profile. Go on MySpace, Facebook or other social networks where your teen may be communicating with friends. Remind her—she's already chosen to make this information public. You are not snooping. You're just asking to see what everyone else already knows about her.

THREE WAYS TO HELP YOUR CHILD SUCCEED IN SCHOOL

Parents want their children to do their best in school. But what works? A study by researchers at Indiana University found that children do better in the classroom when parents:

1. Are positive. You know that your child is sensitive to your emotions. Not surprisingly, the study found that to also be true for parents' attitudes about schoolwork. Parents who thought their child could do an assignment successfully had a child who believed that, too. In addition, the study found

that encouragement from a parent led a child to be more motivated. Model positive attitudes, and your child will copy them.

- **2. Break it down.** A long assignment can overwhelm your child. One of the easiest things you can do to help is to break that big task into smaller pieces. The study found that when children worked at a task they thought they could handle, they did better at it.
- **3. Teach the importance** of a final check. One of the best habits to instill in your child is to look over his work before handing it in. Oops—he added when he should have subtracted. He wrote *their* instead of *there*. Correcting these minor mistakes can lead to a much better overall grade. In addition, the study found that children who were in the habit of checking over their work were more likely to volunteer to answer questions in class.

"Be Present"

The year has finally begun! It is refreshing to have students in the halls and exciting to remember why we enter into the education profession, the students. Personally, my transition into Elgin Public has been nothing but positive. The community has been welcoming, the staff has been helpful, and the students have been patient, as I manage to forget their names on an hourly basis.

I began the year with a simple message to the students: Be Present. When in class, be in class. When at practice, be at practice. Be Present. To think about it differently, if an athlete steps out onto the practice field with a half effort or for-

gets plays, they may lose playing time. If a student does not memorize their lines for a performance, they may not be able to perform. If a student does not commit to learning, they may not pass the test. Be Present.

The teachers have been working hard preparing for students. They invest a lot of time and energy into their classrooms so they can offer a viable curriculum. Teachers do this because they get excited about those "Ah-Ha" moments when a student puts two and two



together, they take pride in students mastering skills and topics, and they get to see these students become successful adults.

As the principal, my hope is that I can help students take advantage of these incredible resources. As parents, I want to leave you with one thought:

Our students do not get stronger by looking at the weights. He/she gets stronger by lifting them. Our students will not gain knowledge by merely showing up to class. He/she will gain knowledge by taking notes, doing homework, and studying for tests. Help your children get stronger. Every night ask them what they learned and see if you can spot them!

Be Present.

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
