

What happens after you submit the FAFSA?

If you're a college-bound senior, you and your parents may have already submitted the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) – or will soon do so. Here's what will happen next:

• Expect your SAR and Award Notification

You will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) after you submit the FAFSA. This acknowledges that your form was processed and can be used to make corrections to your FAFSA. You'll need the PIN you used to file the FAFSA to make electronic corrections.

The colleges you listed on the FAFSA will send you a financial aid award notification (by mail or electronically detailing the assistance they're offering. They may offer a combination of scholarships, grants, work-study and student loans.

• Compare award notifications

Compare award notifications from the colleges. Calculate your out-of-pocket expenses for each school to get the whole financial picture. Use the <u>Award Letter Comparison Calculator</u> at **EducationQuest.org** to determine which school offers the best financial aid package. Respond to each notification keeping in mind that most students accept all award packages until they make their final college selection.

Keep looking for scholarships!

Many local, state and national scholarships have deadlines in March, April and May. Talk to your guidance counselor about scholarships that meet your criteria. For local and state scholarships, visit <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at **EducationQuest.org**.

Juniors: It's time to start your campus visits

Start looking at colleges your junior year so you can narrow your choices by the time you're a senior. Follow these tips for successful campus visits:

- Explore your career interests. Before you determine which colleges you want to visit, think about your career interests and then research colleges that fit your interests. Ask your guidance counselor about career assessment tools at your school. To find colleges that offer your desired major, see the Index of Majors at EducationQuest.org.
- Visit your top college choices while the schools are in session. You won't get the true flavor of the school during breaks or finals week.
- Schedule your visits at least two weeks in advance. Ask for appointments with an admissions representative, financial aid counselor, and a faculty member in your area of interest.
- Talk to a faculty member about upper-level classes in your anticipated major. Many students change majors because they don't understand the subject matter or the degree of difficulty.
- Ask the financial aid counselor how the college may offset tuition costs and about college-based scholarship applications and deadlines.
- Check out college Web sites. You'll find admission requirements, academic and social information, and campus photos or a virtual tour.




Brieann and Christy ask whether different types of alcium.

The Nebraska legislature is again in session and with a number of education bills already under discussion. This session is a 60 day session and ends on April 14th. Time will tell how the session plays out for education. About 400 new bills have been filed with about 100 of them having some possible effects on education. We will continue to monitor the session and work toward passing bills that are beneficial to education and our school district.

Senators have expressed feelings that bills having a financial impact will likely not be passed or get out of committee this legislative session. They are trying to hold the line on expenditures. Senators also cautioned schools to plan ahead for the 2011-12 fiscal year when the next biennial budget is made by the legislature. State budget shortfalls are anticipated to be near the \$1,000,000,000 mark at that time. Also after next school year the Federal Stimulus dollars are to be gone. Those shortfalls will likely come to schools in the form of less revenue from the state. During the 2008-09 school year approximately 20% of our cash receipts came via state aid.

Some key bills for this session include: LB240 - Requires schools to spend at least 65% on direct classroom instruction; LB742 - Eliminates confidentiality for any settlement agreements involving public entities; LB898-Student Expression Act- Requires a policy dealing with students publishing in school sponsored publications; LB 1006 – Kindergarten entrance date would change to 5 on or before July 31 beginning with the '12-'13 school year rather than the previous date of October 15th; LB1021 - High School Activities Association Act would impose multiple requirements on the Nebraska State Activities Association (NSAA); LB962 - would require blood lead testing prior to school enrollment and LB697 – would prohibit use of wireless devices by school bus drivers. The bills change by amendments as they are discussed.

Four members of the Elgin chapter competed in the following events: Michelle Bauer – Family Challenges and Issues; Jessica Heithoff – Illustrated Talks; and Brieann Grosserode and Connor Kinney in Health and Wellness. Jessica and Connor earned gold medals while Michelle earned Gold runner up in her division. Brieann Grosserode received a silver medal for her presentation. The Elgin members were among approximately 150 members from nine other district 8 FCCLA chapters.
