## Agriculture Classes Tour Ag Industries



The Agricultural Entrepreneurship and Animal Science classes toured two Ag Industries in Northeast Nebraska on Tuesday March $19^{\text {th }}$. The tours were set up through the Northeast Career Academy. The career academy is a plan of study created for high school students from a career cluster area which outlines a pathway for career exploration. Elgin Public Schools partners with Northeast Community College to offer courses in which students can earn credit to NECC, one of which is Cow/Calf Management or Animal Science this spring semester.

The two industries that the classes toured where Burbach Dairy in Hartington and Husker Ag Ethanol Plant in Plainview. Burbach Dairy is a small operation which bottles their own hormone free milk in glass bottles at their milking facilities. The dairy was very interesting for everyone. A couple highlights were getting to taste test their milk including strawberry, chocolate, and blue raspberry and we seeing a Holstein Bull (which we were all reminded of the fact that Holstein bulls are quite mean).

At Husker Ag the students toured the inside of the ethanol plant. At the plant 75 million gallons of denatured ethanol are produced every year. The kids were shown the step by step process the corn takes from the time it enters the plant to the finished product whether that be ethanol or modified gluten.

We've started the last quarter of the school year! Wow time goes by fast. The second grade will learn many new things this last quarter; we're getting ready for third grade. Math assignments included counting money and telling time to five minute intervals. We are now working with geometric shapes and figures. We just finished our Social Studies unit discussing our economic system and interactions of consumers and producers. We are starting to learn about cultural and ethnic groups. In language we recently learned how to write a short paragraph, remembering to indent, write sentences after the period, and not write each sentence on a new line is difficult to do.

The second grade is participating in the 2012-2013 Ag in the Classroom Ag Pen Pal Program. This program is sponsored by Nebraska Foundation for Agricultural Awareness. We are writing letters to a ranch family near Burwell NE. They sent a video about their ranch and showed us pictures, informed us how a twin calf can be adopted by a different cow and introduced us to new terms like dams- or cows and sires- or bulls. The students enjoy getting the letters and learning about ranch life.
In March the second graders shared their learning accomplishments during student led conferences. We are proud to report that each student had family members attend.


## What's the chance of that?!

The fourth, fifth, and sixth graders have been learning about probability.
Fourth grade made tree diagrams to find how many combinations there are and predicted the probability of a random event.

Fifth grade learned about how likely it is that an event will occur, 0 being impossible and 1 being certain. They then drew tree diagrams to list all of the possible outcomes. Then they found the probability of independent and dependent events.
For example,
A bag contains 4 cubes: 2 red and 2 green. Pick 2 cubes, one at a time, from the bag without looking. What is the probability of picking a green and then a red?
Well, after you pick the first cube do you put it back in the bag? If so, then it is an independent event. If not, it is a dependent event.
In class we found that if we put the cube back, the probability of picking a green cube and then a red cube would be 4 out of 16. If we do not put the cube back, the probability would be 4 out of 12 .

Sixth grade relearned all that plus complementary and mutually exclusive events, experimental probability, and the Counting Principle.

We did a lot of experimenting in class and you can check out the website to see more pictures of the fourth, fifth, and sixth graders.

## Showtime Draws Near

The sixth graders have been preparing for the upcoming NeSA Reading Test weekly since last August.
Ask them and they will tell you it seems like forever. The test is scheduled for April 3rd and $4{ }^{\text {th }}$. Good Luck to each of you!

## Seniors ... it's decision time!

It's time to decide which college you will attend. Follow our advice to find the right fit for you.
First, gather and compare your college acceptance notifications, financial aid award notifications and campus visit notes. Consider items such as:

- Location - Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If so, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.
- Cost - Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in student and parent loans will you need to cover expenses?
- Academic program - Does the college offer the program that interests you? What happens if you change majors? Does the college offer other programs that interest you?
- Student life - Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? Do you like the living arrangements provided by the school? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

## Juniors ... start looking for scholarships

Follow these tips to begin the scholarship application process:

- Create files and place scholarship applications in deadline order.

## Statewide Assessment

The statewide assessment (NeSA) begins later this month! The assessments will take place in Reading and Math this year for grades $3^{\text {rd }}-8^{\text {th }}$ and $11^{\text {th }}$ with assessments in Science in the $5^{\text {th }}, 8^{\text {th }}$, and $11^{\text {th }}$ grades.

The NeSA test serves many purposes for the school and the Nebraska Department of Education. As a staff, we want to make sure students are prepared and comfortable with the test so their focus is on answering the questions. Here are a few of the things the teachers have been doing to ensure a positive test taking experience:
taking tutorials about the system
taking practice assessments
practicing in the same environment as the test with the C4L system
reviewing content and skills
talking about the assessments
trying to excite students about the upcoming assessments!
As parents, there are a few things you can do that will help your student succeed:
sleep for 8 hours the night before
eat a protein as part of breakfast
talk to them about the assessments
encourage students to spend as much time as they need stay positive about the assessments!
