

On Wednesday, March 18, the EPS Speech Team accomplished something that hasn't been done for a very long time. They were crowned District Champions at the D2-3 Speech Contest in Ewing.

In the process of earning some new hardware for the halls of EPS, the team also qualified eleven students in eight events for the State Speech Championships in Kearney on Friday.

The OID of Christopher Bush, Alois Warner, Kenny Bush and Jaime Hoefer earned District Champion honors. They received first place medals and qualified for state.

The duet of Ethan Fischer and Kenny Bush also qualified for state, earning District Runners-up medals. Additional District Runners-up medals were captured by Lisa Dohmen in Humorous Prose and Tyler Smith in Entertainment Speaking. Both will represent EPS at the state contest.

Receiving third place medals and also qualifying were Dylan Widger in Poetry, Paige Nichols in Entertainment Speaking, Morgan Carpenter in Humorous Prose, and Warner and Zoey Bergman in Duet Acting.

Katie Polk and Hoefer placed 4th and 5th respectively in Serious Prose. The OID of Taya Voborny, Widger and Bergman earned a Superior Rating. Lisa Dohmen also earned a Superior Rating in Poetry.

Co-coaches Stacy Shumake-Henn and Jessie Reestman were thrilled with the team's accomplishment. "The kids have been asking how long it has been since Elgin won a district championship in speech. We keep telling them 'a very long time."

According to the coaches, some of the team members have been doing their research. "So far, they have found a district championship plaque from about 27 years ago, but nothing more recent as of yet."

The coaches attribute the title to an impressive work ethic. "We've told these kids from day one that we would have the potential to compete as a team this year, but we'd need a solid effort from everyone, and they definitely rose to the occasion," said Reestman and Shumake-Henn. "Their accomplishments are a testament to what hard work and commitment can do."

The team will round out their season with a performance at the community center Wednesday night, a pep rally on Thursday, and the state contest on Friday at UNK.

Seniors ... it's decision time!

Follow our advice to decide on the college that's the right fit for you.

First, compare your college acceptance letters, financial aid award notifications and campus visit notes. Write down pros and cons for each school you're considering using the following criteria:

- Location Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If so, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.
- **Cost** Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in student and parent loans will you need to cover expenses?
- Academic program Does the college offer the program that interests you? What happens if you change majors? Does the college offer other programs that interest you?
- Student life Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? Do you like the living arrangements provided by the school? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

Make your final decision by May 1 – and then notify the colleges you're rejecting so they can offer your spot, and any financial aid, to another student.

Juniors ... start looking for scholarships

Follow these tips to begin the scholarship application process:

- Start searching! In addition to checking in often with your school counselor, visit free online sites including <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org with over 2,000 local and state scholarships. Other sources might include your parent's employer, your employer or local service organizations.
- Create files and place scholarship applications in deadline order.
- Get involved in extracurricular activities and community service a critical component for many scholarships. Track your involvement using <u>Activities Resume</u>.
- Do your best to get good grades in school and good scores on ACT/SAT exams. These factors are especially important for college-based scholarships.
- Determine if you will qualify for need-based scholarships by completing the <u>College Funding Estimator</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Learn about scholarships and tuition assistance programs offered by colleges that interest you. Programs such as <u>Collegebound</u> at the University of Nebraska, <u>Advantage</u> offered by the Nebraska State College System, and <u>NWU Advantage</u> at Nebraska Wesleyan University, cover the cost of tuition if you meet income and academic criteria

If you receive offers for scholarship and financial aid services, investigate them if they charge a fee. Elementary Reading Night





Facts About Reading Aloud

Reading aloud to children is vital because it helps them acquire the information and skills they need in life:

- Knowledge of printed letters and words, and the relationship between sound and print.
- The meaning of words.
- How books work, and a variety of writing styles.
- The world in which they live.
- The difference between written language and everyday conversation.
- The pleasure of reading.

• Reading to young children promotes language acquisition and literacy development and, later on, achievement in reading comprehension and overall success in school. The percentage of young children read aloud to daily by a family member is one indicator of how well young children are prepared for school. Yet, recent studies on family reading suggest too many youngsters go without the benefit of a family member reading to them.

Third Grade NeSA Testing



Spring is a very busy time in the third grade classroom. The third graders will be taking the NeSA (Nebraska State Accountability) tests this month for the very first time. Students will be tested in the areas of math and reading.

They have been working hard in the classroom to get prepared. During class we have reviewed math and reading vocabulary daily to help us understand the terms that are used on the tests. The students have been going to the computer lab to



familiarize themselves with the format of the test. Students have been completing practice tests both in math and reading to help ease any nerves.

Please remember to make sure your child gets a good night's rest before school and to eat a healthy breakfast to begin their day.

Statewide Assessment (NeSA)

The statewide assessment (NeSA) begins later this month! The assessments will take place in Reading and Math this year for grades 3rd-8th and 11th with additional assessments in Science in the 5th, 8th, and 11th grades.

The NeSA test serves many purposes for the school and the Nebraska Department of Education. As a staff, we want to make sure students are prepared and comfortable with the test so their focus is on answering the questions. Here are a few of the things the teachers have been doing to ensure a positive test taking experience:

taking practice assessments practicing in the same environment as the test with the C4L system reviewing content and skills talking about the assessments trying to excite students about the upcoming assessments!

As parents, there are a few things you can do that will help your student succeed: sleep for 8 hours the night before eat a protein as part of breakfast talk to them about the assessments encourage students to spend as much time as they need stay positive about the assessments!
