
Students may submit their artwork to the Antelope County Fair in the Open Class division this summer as well.

EPS Speech Team Qualifies Seven for State, Earns D2-2 Runners-up Plaque

When the EPS Speech Team left for the D2-2 District Speech Contest in Bancroft on Wednesday, they had no idea theywouldn't be returning home until Friday morning.

They also had no idea of the success they would experience.

The team returned with seventeen medals and the D2-2 District Runners-up plaque.

Seven team members will represent Elgin in eight events at the state competition.

Kira Widger, Theanna Dunn and Hunter Reestman brought home top honors on the day. Widger and Dunn's Duet won gold, as did Reestman's Entertainment speech.

Runners-up medals were earned by Adam Dreger and Cory Romej in Duet, Widger in Serious Prose, and Grace Rittscher in Humorous Prose.

The OID of Reestman, Widger, Rittscher, Dreger and Dunn was also crowned runners-up after tying for the title of champion with St. Edward.

Rittscher captured 3rd place with her Entertainment speech.

Jordan Lindgren punched his ticket to state with his Informative speech, placing 3rd.

Rittscher and Widger accomplished a feat new to the speech team this year. Both are triple entered at the state speech contest. Widger will be competing in OID, Duet and Serious. Rittscher is going in OID, Humorous and Entertainment.

This is the first year speech competitors have been allowed to participate in three events in district competition. Brea Carr narrowly missed a trip to state, placing 4th in Extemporaneous Speaking, while Reestman placed 5th.

Dunn placed 5th in Serious Prose as well.

Olivia Lindgren and Mateo Kirstine earned Superior Ratings in Poetry, as did Talena Woodard in Humorous Prose.

Co-coaches Jessie Reestman and Stacy Shumake-Henn were thrilled with the day's events.

"We couldn't be happier with the kids. They all put in their best performances of the season, and they did it when it counted."

Following a late but joy-filled awards presentation, the team was faced with a new dilemma: How to get home. Due to the flooding, all roads home were closed.

Superintendent Dan Polk took action, booking rooms so both Elgin teams (EPS and PJ), could take refuge in West Point.

Upon their safe arrival, the teams were taken care of well by accompanying parents and grandparents, as well as the town of West Point.

"We just can't thank everyone enough for their help. Mr. Polk, Duane [bus driver], the parents, and grandparents were terrific through this whole experience. Even community members from home contacted people they knew in West Point to offer help. And the town of West Point was unbelievable. Their constant care and attention throughout the ordeal was amazing. I also have to give credit to the kids for keeping things in perspective. They were troopers," said Shumake-Henn.

The students busied themselves in a number of ways, including making new friends with the St. Edward and

North Bend teams who were stranded right along with them.

As roads at home cleared up, West Point's status worsened. However, the team was able to make it home Friday morning, after tirelessly searching for possible routes.

The team will compete at the State Speech Championships in Kearney on Friday and hope to return that same night!



Greetings from Elgin High School Math! With all of the water and ice-related news, it doesn't seem as though parabolas and sectors and integration are quite as important to teach. However, if you think about it another way, many of the structures that were damaged in the recent flood wouldn't exist without the mathematics behind the engineering. Roads and bridges have been built to support the weight of vehicles driving over them. Dams were built to hold back a finite amount of water. Houses were built to stand against wind and rain. There was a lot of math involved in designing and building those structures with a solid foundation. Nebraska was reminded in February that water and ice is capable of eroding that foundation (or attacking from the side).

When the structures were built, this magnitude of water and ice were not part of the calculations. It isn't surprising that many bridges and roadways failed. I am amazed at how much of the infrastructure survived the inflow of water and ice. It will take engineers with mathematical skills to re-build bridges that have been destroyed, and repair crews will need to rely on their construction knowledge to repair many of the culverts and roadways to make them safe for travel. As homes and businesses assess damages, again, engineers will need to use mathematics to determine if the structure is sound or if it needs to be torn down.

The math may not be fancy, but it is critical that our schools make sure the students have a basic understanding of mathematics so they can contribute to the rebuilding of the community when disaster strikes again. Thank you to all of the city, county and state employees and volunteers that have been instrumental in getting Nebraska (as well as surrounding states) back on a solid foundation. Nebraska: Mathematically Strong!

If you're like me as a parent with technology, you are a bit of a foreigner in the land of natives! For one thing, I don't speak the same language as my kids, but I know some of the phrases! Or, I know enough to know what is popular, new, and trendy, but struggle to fit in! Technology has definitely changed in my lifetime!

Even though I have embraced social media, smart phones, Netflix, Amazon, etc., I still have concerns as a parent. How much screen time is too much? Are any of the apps on my kids' devices unsafe? Although the Federal Law says that age 13 is the age a kid can legally register for social media, am I hurting my kids socially by not allowing? Isn't it weird to watch YouTube videos of some guy playing Fortnight? Are my kids being bullied online? How can I make sure my kids aren't accessing inappropriate videos, even by accident?

As a parent and an educator, it is hard to keep up!

As a school counselor, it is part of my elementary digital citizenship curriculum to work with students on how to be safe online, how to leave a positive digital footprint, and how to recognize and report cyber bullying. Parents also want to be up-to-date. And I'd like to start sharing the information that I receive that can help parents. That is why "Eagle Watch" has been created. "Eagle Watch" is an online presence on the Elgin Public School's website under the "Guidance" tab. It is a space that houses resource information that users of the website can access. Its predominant purpose is to help parents keep up-to-date on risky trends, challenges, and behaviors via articles and videos.

I know that "Eagle Watch" can't encompass all the risky trends, challenges, and behaviors, but hopefully it can be useful.

Statewide Assessment (NSCAS) Nebraska Student Centered Assessment System

The statewide assessment (NSCAS) is in early April! The assessments will take place in Reading and Math this year for grades 3rd-8th with additional assessments in Science in the 5th and 8th grades.

The NSCAS test serves many purposes for the school and the Nebraska Department of Education. As a staff, we want to make sure students are prepared and comfortable with the test so their focus is on answering the questions. Here are a few of the things the teachers have been doing to ensure a positive test taking experience:

taking practice assessments practicing in the same environment as the test with TESTWIZ reviewing content and skills talking about the assessments trying to excite students about the upcoming assessments!

As parents, there are a few things you can do that will help your student succeed: sleep for 8 hours the night before eat a protein as part of breakfast talk to them about the assessments encourage students to spend as much time as they need stay positive about the assessments!
