We are currently learning about pictographs and bar graphs. We have answered questions about pictographs and bar graphs using the clickers that go with our Promethean



board. The students also created bar graphs using the tools on our board. In the next weeks, we will be starting multiplication and division in math. So far we have had four students pass all addition and subtraction timed tests!

We started doing "Lesson Connections" in October which is a book that goes with our Reading Mastery program. The students have been learning about titles, characters, setting, plot, problem, and resolution in their reading stories and AR



books. The students have been filling out story maps that go along with each reading story or their AR books. They have become very good about finding the main events in a story and the problem/ Students have also made resolution. predictions about stories and then are able to check their predictions the next day. The students have also learned the difference between narrative and

expository texts. Some of the students have been finding these different types of texts in the library. We will be reviewing these story elements and types of text throughout the year to prepare for the NESA-Reading assessment in the spring.

In Science, the students have just finished learning about rocks, minerals, and changes to the earth's land. We will be learning about force, gravity and Newton's Laws of Motion after Thanksgiving. In Social Studies, we are continuing to learn about the Midwest states and should be starting the Northeast region by December.

To estimate your FAFSA results now, use the <u>College Funding Estimator</u> at **EducationQuest.org**. This program will ask for 2012 income tax information. You may estimate your tax information to complete the *Estimator* but should use your completed 2012 tax returns when you submit the actual FAFSA.

Seniors...have you submitted your college applications?

If you haven't submitted your admission applications yet, it's time to get serious! Contact your top college choices to determine application deadlines and procedures. Ask if the admission application is also the application for college-based scholarships. If not, ask about the scholarship application process.

Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

- Don't pay for scholarship searches. Use free resources such as <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org with over 2,000 Nebraskabased scholarships. Free national sites include <u>Fastaid</u>, <u>Scholarship Monkey</u>, <u>ScholarshipExperts.com</u>, <u>School Soup</u>, and <u>Scholarships.com</u>.
- Visit your guidance counselor often for information about local scholarships.
- Place scholarship applications in deadline order. Local awards and college-specific applications deserve top priority because you're more likely to earn them.
- Update your activities, honors, community service or paid jobs using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exam in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline.
- **Tailor your essay to the scholarship.** Ask an English teacher to read your essay and offer advice on making a big impact. Your essay will need to stand out from other applications.
- Pay close attention to grammar, spelling and neatness. Ask at least two people to proofread your entire application.



Geometry is the mathematical study of space. This includes definitions of necessary terms concerning geometry, the study of the properties of different shapes, and application of their properties to real life situation. Geometry studies the concepts of congruence, similarity, right triangle measure, and parallel lines. Area and volume of different geometric shapes will be explored in the spring. The student will demonstrate formal deductive reasoning (done for this year) and inductive reasoning (on-going). The study of points, lines, and their relationships will be incorporated with the use of the computer throughout the year.


Sixth graders are using the 6 traits of writing to compose descriptive paragraphs. Traits include: ideas, organization, voice, word choice, sentence

Ah the time continues to fly as we have fun in the EPS English room. And just what do we do to make time pass so quickly? Here's a tiny glimpse of what we've been up to in the wonderful world of language arts.

The Seniors continue to hold their noses to the grindstone. After an epic, fun-filled *Beowulf* adventure, they turned to the joys of research. Following some discussion of credible sources and the alleged evils of *Wikipedia*, the students were off and surfing. Their step-by-step research process has

included an annotated bibliography, paraphrasing and quoting practice, writing around the quote, and outlining. Though the work keeps them busy, we do still continue to have some entertaining moments. After all, it is the Seniors.

The Juniors are currently enjoying the fruits of their Shakespeare-reading labors by watching the most modern version of *Romeo and Juliet*. From here, we will move into an advertising unit that coincides with our early American literature unit and the persuasive writing unit we have been working on. Common writing errors, vocabulary workbooks, and the writing process have been keeping the students busy as well.

The Sophomores, or as I like to call them, poets in progress, are now delving into the world of descriptive writing. Using their newfound poetry knowledge, they are now applying some creative wording to the essay writing process--a means of developing some of the more subjective traits of writing. Once we travel further down the road of our writing journey, we will take Greek mythology by the horns and experience its vast impact on today's society.

The Freshmen, too, are honing their writing skills. These beginning authors are currently applying daily grammar lessons and exercises to their narrative writing masterpieces. Members of the class are working either individually or in partners to apply all that they have learned during the short story unit to create their own original short stories. Guidelines include following a plot line, demonstrating characteristics of the short story genre, and implementing a number of literary devices. The students are also utilizing the steps of the writing process and applying the Six Traits of writing.

Creative Writing students continue to write creatively. The students have made a smooth transition from poetry to songwriting. After some inspirational guitar and vocal performances by a few members of the class, we have turned our attention toward the defining characteristics of a good song. In groups or individually, these young writers hope to pen some lyrics and add music when possible.







Heithoff Boys Know their Finances!




Kyle Heithoff, Andrew Heithoff, & Nick Heithoff performed well on Finance Challenge!



Students also dissected pumpkins on Halloween to reinforce the knowledge that fertilized eggs develop into seeds and are surrounded by the swollen ovary (the pumpkin 'meat' and shell). They dissected seeds to identify the three parts, and explored the tasty side of plants by eating the toasted pumpkin seeds! Hopefully next time these students see a flower or fruit, they'll appreciate its complexity it a little more!

Fifteen members of the Elgin FFA Chapter along with around 55,000 other FFA members, advisors, and guests across the United States attended the 85th annual National FFA Convention in Indianapolis IN. October 24th – 27th. For the past seven years the convention has been held in Indy and will move to Louisville, KY for the next seven years and then back to Indy in 2016.


While in Indy members attended sessions, visited the National FFA Expo, shopped at the FFA shopping mall, saw Brantley Gilbert and The Band Perry, and went to "The World's Toughest Rodeo" featuring the best bull and bronc riders, toured Churchill Downs in Louisville, KY and stopped at the St. Louis Arch. Among those keynote speakers during the sessions were Olympic gold medalist figure skater, Scott Hamilton, the National FFA Advisor, Dr. Steve Brown along with speeches and ceremonies made by the National FFA Officers, and Josh Bleill, an Iraq War veteran and now spokesperson for the Indianapolis Colts, who was severely wounded in 2006 in Fallujah, Iraq, losing both of his legs above the knees. Besides being able to attend and visit these exciting places and hear these inspiring messages, the member's watched national contests including parliamentary procedure and public speaking. They also sat in on a workshop of choice, many of which attended one called "Protect the Harvest" which discussed how students can identify current legislative issues that threaten American livestock production and other animal -related activities and how to advocate on these issues on behalf of farmers, ranchers, hunters and related agribusinesses.

On Saturday, the last day of convention three members of the Elgin Chapter officially received their American FFA Degree. Alex Dierks, Nathan Anderson, and Ben Pelster all met the qualifications to receive this high honor. Ben was the only one able to make the trip out, but we are very proud of all three of them!

Up next for the FFA Chapter are Leadership Skill Events or LSE's in O'Neill on December 12th. These are state qualifying public speaking events such as Parliamentary Procedure, Sr. and Jr. Public Speaking, Agriculture Demonstration, Job Interview, and Creed Speaking. All members that are participating have been practicing hard and we are looking forward to a good contest.


