



The third and fourth grade classes recently visited Kreycik's Elk and Buffalo Ranch in the morning and then went on to Ashfall Fossil Beds Historical State Park in the afternoon. At Kreycik's Elk and Buffalo Ranch, the students and teachers rode in a covered wagon to see over forty female elk along with one bull elk. The bull was very protective of the females, making sure they stayed out of sight of the other bulls which were located in another pen. The students got to experience the bugle call of the bull elk which is only done in the fall season. Next, the students rode over to the buffalo pen and were able to feed them corn by hand! For some of the students, this was their favorite part of the day. Also in the buffalo pen, was a long-horn steer named Boomer. After feeding the buffalo, the students visited the last pen of bull elk. The guide explained how these bulls had their antlers cut off to harvest the velvet. She explained the process of harvesting the velvet and the products made from the velvet. Students were able to feel an antler that had velvet on it. Students also learned about the fallow deer from Europe which were located in the pen with the bull elk.

Next the students enjoyed lunch with a beautiful view at Niobrara State Park. Then we traveled on to Ashfall Fossil Beds Historical State Park. Students listened to the tour guide explain about the volcano and ash that killed many animals. Students were able to walk around and view many different kinds of fossils. Then, the students went down to the Rhino Barn to view the site of the rhino fossils. Students learned how paleontologists look and dig for fossils. Everyone was amazed at how long the process takes to dig fossils. Students also were able to see tools that the paleontologists use. Last, students were able to look at items in the gift shop to remember their trip. Check out the

TOUGH math classes results in high scores!

Algebra Two allows the student to extend the knowledge of operations on real numbers. They will solve equations and inequalities, using a variety of graphing techniques, and solve systems of linear equations. Students will apply functions and utilities problem solving techniques (very important). They will perform operations on rational expressions, simplify radical and quadratic function, and apply exponential and logarithmic functions. Students will also be introduced to conic sections, trigonometric functions, sequences and series.

We have 2 very important tests that we take in the spring for Juniors: ACT (college entrance test) and the NeSA (Nebraska State Assessment). In the first two years of NeSA, Elgin High Juniors have placed 5th and 3rd out of 249 schools in the state and this last year we were 27th out of 249 schools. It's a great achievement but every year we have to aim high to reach and maintain this goal. It takes lots of hard work to achieve this goal. We start preparing for NeSA & ACT as freshmen and it continues in Geometry. Remember: HARD CLASSES and HARD WORK pays off!!!

CREDIT SCORE BASICS

Although high school students may be too young to have a credit history, they are not too young to start planning for their financial future.


"Whether you're buying a home, a car, or applying for a credit card - lenders want to know the risk they're taking by lending you money. Credit scores are used to determine credit risk. A credit score can affect how much money a lender will lend you and at what terms (interest rate)." SOURCE: <u>myfico.com</u>

Credit scores range from 300 to 850. A higher score means that you are a BETTER credit risk. In other words, banks are **more** willing to lend money to people with **higher** credit scores.

A credit score cannot be established until a person has credit history. Once someone receives a loan (or credit) from a lending institution, a credit history begins. For most people, the start of their credit history was

their first credit card or a student loan. Once you have a credit history started, it is important to take steps to improve your score!

The chart below shows what all goes into a credit score. As you can see, payment history, is the most important component of the credit score. Thus, the best ways to improve your credit score is to pay your bills **ON TIME!**



WHEN TO KEEP A CHILD HOME WITH ILLNESS DURING COLD AND FLU SEASON

Sometimes it can be difficult for a parent to decide whether to send children to school when they wake up with early symptoms of an illness or complaints that they do not feel well. In general, during cold and flu season, unless your child is significantly ill, the best place for them is in school where they have all already been exposed to the same germs and where they are less likely to expose other more vulnerable people, like the very young or very old, to their routine bouts of cold and flu. Remind and show your children to discard used tissues promptly, not to share personal items, to cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze, to keep their hands away from their face, and to wash hands thoroughly and often with soap and warm water. Suggest that they silently sing the Happy Birthday song twice while

Gwen Kinney, RN washing their hands. However, there are some situations in which it is best to plan on ESU #8 School Nurse keeping your child home for a day to rest or to arrange for an appointment with your

health care provider. The following are a few such situations that warrant watching and possibly conferring with your health care provider:

✦ Persistent fever greater than 100.4° orally, including a fever that requires control with medication, like Tylenol

- + Child is too sleepy or ill from an illness, like vomiting and/or diarrhea, to profit from sitting in class all day
- ✤ Significant cough that makes a child feel uncomfortable or disrupts the class

✤ Sore throat that is severe, accompanied by fever and/or feeling ill, that persists longer than 48 hours, OR after known exposure to a confirmed case of Streptococcal throat infection

✦ Honey-crusted sores around the nose or mouth or rash on other body parts that might be impetigo; OR a rash in various stages including boils, sores and bumps that may be chicken pox; OR a significant rash accompanied by other symptoms of illness such as fever

- Red, runny eyes that distract the child from learning
- ✤ Large amount of discolored nasal discharge, especially if accompanied by facial pain or headache
- Severe ear pain or drainage from the ear
- ✦ Severe headache, especially if accompanied by fever
- Any condition that you think may be serious or contagious to others.

Finally, if you know your child is still running a fever, it is not a good idea simply to give them Tylenol and send them onto school because as soon as the medicine wears off, you are apt to get the dreaded call from the school to leave work and come to pick up your feverish child. It is better to let them stay home in bed with a fever and take their medications at home until they are off all medicines and ready to learn for a full day in a classroom. If you find a pattern of your child's asking to stay home from school, especially if they are falling behind or appear anxious by the thought of attending school, or if there does not appear to be any obvious physical symptoms, it may be a good idea to contact your school nurse and your health care provider to discuss your concerns. Remember, whenever you keep your child home from school, please call the school office in advance of the start of the school day and leave a message that your Casa Embrujada." Prepare for the FAFSA with *free* programs and resources

If you're a senior, it's time to start preparing for the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). You should complete the form after January 1 (after you and your parents have completed your 2014 tax returns) but before your college's priority deadline (typically before April 1). Colleges will use your FAFSA results to determine how much they will award you in federal, state and college-based financial aid.

To prepare for the FAFSA, take advantage of these *free* EducationQuest programs and resources:

Financial Aid Programs

EducationQuest is conducting statewide **Financial Aid Programs** that explain the financial aid process and the FAFSA. The programs are free and open to the public. <u>Find the program nearest you</u>. Juniors and seniors and their parents or guardians are encouraged to attend. *If you attend, you will be eligible to register for a \$500 <u>Financial Aid Program Scholarship</u>!*

College Funding Estimator

To estimate your FAFSA results now, use the <u>College Funding Estimator</u> at **EducationQuest.org**. This program will ask for 2014 income tax information. You may estimate your tax information to complete the *Estimator* but should use your completed 2014 tax returns when you complete the FAFSA.

Seniors...have you submitted your college applications?

If you haven't submitted your college admission applications yet, it's time to get serious! Contact your top college choices to determine application deadlines and procedures. Ask if the admission application is also the application for college-based scholarships. If not, ask about the scholarship application process.

Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

- **Don't ever pay for scholarship searches**! Use *free* resources such as <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at **EducationQuest.org** with over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. Free national sites include <u>Fastaid</u>, <u>ScholarshipExperts.com</u>, <u>School Soup</u>, and <u>Scholarships.com</u>.
- Visit your school counselor often for information about local scholarships.
- Focus on local and college-specific scholarships because you're more likely to earn them.
- Update your activities, honors, community service or paid jobs using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exam in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline.
- Tailor your essay to the scholarship. Ask an English teacher to read your essay and offer advice on making a big impact. Your essay will need to stand out from other applications.
