# Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit

I use the Second Step program in grades K-5 grade classroom. The Second Step program teaches children important skills for getting along with others and doing well in school. It also helps our school be a safe, respectful place where everyone can learn.

To further help our school be a safe and respectful place, I also use the Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit. In the lessons, your child learns specific skills to help stop bullying.

Students learn how to:

- Recognize when bullying is happening
- Report bullying to a caring adult
- Refuse to let bullying happen to themselves or others
- · Be a bystander who stands up and is part of the solution to bullying

To "recognize" bullying, students learn the definition of "bullying" which is when someone else keeps being mean to someone else on purpose. One kind of bullying is when someone hurts someone else's body or belongings. Another kind of bullying is when someone keeps saying something to hurt someone else's feelings. Getting other kids to be mean to someone else is also bullying.

We talk about the differences between being rude, teasing, and bullying and that to recognize bullying, the bully has some perceived power over the target. That perceived power can be size, age, wealth, ability, etc. The key difference when recognizing bullying is the emphasis on the definition and the phrase "keeps being mean."

If bullying is recognized, students are then encouraged to report bullying. Students learn that they should report bullying to a trusted adult, and that if the bullying happens on school grounds during the school day, they should report it to a trusted adult at the school. Students learn to say the phrase "I need to report bullying." We discuss a variety of settings: For example, what if the bullying happens at recess? in line at the water fountain? on the bus? walking home from school? The answer to all of those settings is YES, it is considered bullying that should be reported to a trusted adult at school. We identify trusted adults at school: the principal, the classroom teacher, the school counselor, the playground and lunch supervisors, etc. I know that bullying can happen off of school grounds outside of school hours, so we discuss that they should tell parents in that case.

We also discuss the importance of reporting bullying to a trusted adult at school in a private setting. This keeps the target and bully safe. Sometimes students are surprised to learn that not only do we have to help the target, but we also have to help the bully! In a private setting, the adult can also help the target with words and actions that demonstrate refusal skills. Refusal skills include confronting the bully and listing the specific behaviors that the target wants to stop. This self-advocating step is important in the relationship between the target and the bully. Sometimes it is enough to make the bullying stop, especially if the trusted adult witnesses the refusal and/or has informed the on-site supervisors of the usual setting that the bullying behavior took place. Sometimes changes are made to help ensure target is safe. This step is also an important step in making our school safer because if the initial refusal doesn't work, school officials know that more work needs to be done with the bully.

The last section of the Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit is a lesson on the role of a bystander. One reason students bully is for the effect it has on bystanders. Students can gain social status through bullying by looking tough or cool, making others laugh, or showing

they have power. We talk about ways bystanders can make bullying worse and then we practice ways bystanders can use their power to help stop bullying. One source of power is simply to move closer to the target in a show of support. Inviting the target away from the bully is another power a bystander has. A bystander can also encourage the target to report bullying, even going with the target to report it to a trusted adult in a private setting.

The Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit gives students and staff in grades K-5 common language as well as processes to follow: recognize, report, and refuse. This is the second year of implementation at Elgin Public Schools. The curriculum is taught every year with different lessons that include videos of bullies targeting other students as well as practice scenarios for the class to practice recognizing, reporting, and refusing bullying.

At Elgin Public School, we want every student to feel safe and respected. This curriculum helps ensure that!



# Math Classes From Mrs. Lindgren

January was busy for the students in my classroom!

My statistics class is off and running. The students will be learning about random samples, bias, and drawing conclusions! Then they get to work with tables and lots of different formulas!

The computer science students have had to write methods, including returns and overloads. They are learning that sometimes it is better to start with something that works and modify than always starting from scratch. Most importantly, they are learning that simply having a working program in DrJava isn't enough to satisfy CodeRunner, the code-checking application for their computer science course!



My geometry students recently finished a chapter on similarity and are working on some trigonometry! They should be ready for spring MAPS testing with this knowledge!

The Algebra I class has finished what I consider the hardest chapter in their book working with exponents. They had to keep track of when to add, multiply or keep the exponents, depending on the operation being applied. We even delved into exponential growth and decay!

The CyberPatriot team had technical difficulties During the State competition round, and didn't do so well on solving their vulnerabilities for the different operating systems, but they did well on their cisco quiz and the packet tracer exercise. The points we earned there were enough to put us in the top 25% of our tier. We qualified for the Semi-Final round in the Silver Division and

competed on January 24th. Hopefully the technical issues are behind us, and we do well at this final competition for the year.
