16 Members of the Elgin FCCLA Chapter attended the annual National Cluster Meeting in Omaha Nebraska on November 22-23 2013. The theme for the 2013 conference was Exceeding Expectations With FCCLA. On Friday members attended the opening general session. Ashley Rhodes-Courter presented the keynote address, "Three Little Words: Turning Pain into Power". Ms. Rodes-Courter spent over 10 years in foster care with 14 different placement homes before being adopted at the age of twelve. She encourages audiences to embrace their differences and turn their pain into power.

On Saturday members also attended small group sessions including: Autism Speaks; "Will you listen?", Being in the Public Eye, Can You Get Hooked on FCCLA?, Exceeding Expectations: From Reading Books to Writing Them, FACS Knowledge Bowl, How YOU Can Make a Difference, and Reflect Your Potential. All small sessions encouraged leaders to spread the red and FCCLA's red jacket swag. FCCLA Members also attended two larger sessions entitled: Leaving a Legacy and Walk a Mile. All the members reunited once more for the closing general session. The keynote address speaker was Johan Khalilian. Mr. Klalilian believes we all have a little bit of crazy in us that is waiting to be unleashed. He motivates young people to move past reality and begin to dream and create even the craziest of possibilities for their lives and the world around them.

## Featured EducationQuest Tool

College Funding Estimator provides early awareness of EFC
The College Funding Estimator calculates the Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which is the estimated amount the federal government believes a family can pay toward college for one academic year. By using the Estimator, a family can gain an early awareness of their EFC before they file the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

The Estimator asks the same questions and uses the same calculation as the FAFSA, so the results can help students plan financially for college and determine if they qualify for need-based financial aid including need -based scholarships. This tool is helpful for parents with sophomores, juniors and seniors as they prepare for college expenses.

Activities Resume helps students track extracurricular activities throughout high school The Activities Resume allows students to create a resume of their accomplishments, which they can use when applying to college, submitting scholarship applications, or job searching. With this activity, students will learn how to track activities throughout middle and high school - and have the information readily available by simply logging back into their account. An Activities Resume should include, but is not limited to, school clubs and activities, awards, recognition and honors, volunteer work, mentoring, shadowing, and part-time jobs.
