





New Year's Resolutions 2015



The 2014 Volleyball Season

The C-team finished with a record of 5-3, and during the FR/SO tourney in Verdigre 1 team went 6-2 and the other 3-3. The Freshman placed 2nd in the Neligh tourney.

Our JV girls finished with a record of 9-4 and ended the season by winning the Cedar Rapids tournament on Oct 25th

The Varsity finished with a 26-5 record, all 5 losses to state bound teams, including 2 to Stuart, State runner-up;1 to Crofton, state runner-up; and 2 to St. Marys, state Champions. We were 15 hundredths of a point from a wildcard to make it to state. We ended the season as NVC 3rd place, beating CWC for the 4th time and ending as District Runner-Up.

All the way around it was a great season; but it was so much more than just our records; it was a family of 29 girls working hard day in and day out to make themselves better to make their teammates better and to make the Wolfpack Volleyball program better.

Classroom Snippets ... Study Tips from Resource Room

As we have been doing the writing process for many years, students have been taught the five steps:

- 1) Prewriting
- 2) First Draft
- 3) Revise
- 4) Edit
- 5) Publish

These five steps are taught in the early years of elementary. However,



as the students go through school and move toward the later years, they are not taking the time to always revise and edit their writing as thoroughly as they

should.

What and how we write is communication, and if the reader is unsure of what the author is trying to say, then there is a lack of communication.

With the state-wide writing assessment right around the corner, it is important to remember the importance of revising and editing in the writing process.

Second Grade News

Learning doesn't slow down in the second grade room! It has been another busy month. Our new math program has us achieving something new all the time. Last



month we measured with rulers and counted change using dimes, nickels, & pennies. We are adding single digit

numbers with sums up to 18, discovering lines of symmetry, and even measured ingredients when making apple jack cookies. We are starting to add two digit numbers, using pennies and dimes.

Second Graders have been busy learning contractions, writing many paragraphs, and writing letters to partner in our room. We received our first letter from our Ag in the Classroom family. They are a farm family from Central City. They raise popcorn, corn, soybeans, and hogs.

Every ones reading has really improved from the start of school in August. The students are working hard to



be fluent readers. Science found the 2nd grade class discussing the 4 seasonal changes and now we're learning about how living things change as they grow. We hope everyone had an enjoyable Thanksgiving and Christmas. Look forward to having the class ready to start a new semester in January.
