Seniors ... borrow wisely for college!

Review these tips before you decide how much to borrow in student loans:



Borrow only what you need, even if it's less than the amount offered in your award letter.

I Try to use your student loan money *only* for tuition, room & board, books and fees. Get a part-time job during college to pay personal expenses.

Compare the estimated starting salary of your potential future careers to your estimated college debt to
ensure you can afford future loan payments.

D Apply for financial aid each year you attend college by completing the FAFSA.

² Continue to look for scholarships while you're in college.

Classroom Snippets . .

Gardening in 3rd Grade

The 3rd graders have started studying plants and animals in Science class. We have learned about the life cycle of plants starting from seed and growing into a plant. The 3rd graders planted bean seeds into clear plastic cups to see firsthand the life cycle of a bean plant.

Students were divided into three groups according to the type



of soil they used for their bean seed. One group used potting mix. Another group used sand while the last group used gravel from the

playground. The students made predictions on which plant will grow best. They have recorded data on the growth of their seeds each week.

We will continue to check and record data on the growth of the plants until the end of the school year to see which type of soil is the winner.



6th Grade Update

The sixth graders are currently writing research papers



about a president of their choice. Their process includes reading sources, taking notes, completing an outline, writing a

first draft, documenting sources, writing a bibliography or works cited page, revising first draft, and proofreading final copy.

SUMMER SLIDE

Something is waiting for many children every summer, and their parents don't even know it's out there. It's called the "summer slide," and it describes what happens when young minds sit idle for three months.

Children who do not read over the summer will lose more than two months of reading achievement. Summer

reading loss is cumulative. By the end of 6th grade children who lose reading skills over the summer will be



2 years behind their classmates.

Three easy ideas to help:

- Six books to summer success: Research shows that reading just six books during the summer may keep a struggling reader from regressing.
- 2. Read something everyday: Encourage your child to take advantage of every opportunity to read. Find them throughout the day
- 3. Keep reading aloud to them no matter the age.



<u>Junior High</u> <u>Students Complete</u> <u>Literature Units</u>

The seventh graders are wrapping up Linda Sue Park's *A Long Walk to Water*. It is a true story of Salva Dut, a Lost Boy from



Sudan and his battle to stay alive. It also includes the fictional story of Nya, a Sudanese girl whose

major conflict is a daily struggle to find clean water for her family. It is an inspirational story, and they have done a nice job with the novel.

The eighth graders have divided into three literature circle groups and are reading two classic novels. The two groups of girls are reading *My Antonia* by Nebraska author Willa Cather. It clearly describes the struggles of our early settlers. The boys are reading *The Call of the Wild* by Jack London, a story of Buck, a stolen dog, that

endures many owners and challenges as they search for gold in the Yukon



territory. They meet in small groups and discuss the books; it's a great way for them to take ownership of

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2015 State FFA, Elgin FFA Members Excel!



FFA members from across the state competed and were honored for their accomplishments at the 87th Nebraska State FFA Convention held April 8-10, 2015. The convention was held at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the hotels in Lincoln's Haymarket, and the University of Nebraska – Lincoln East Campus.

Just fewer than 4,000 Nebraska FFA students attended the convention, the largest State Convention attendance in the history of the organization. The Pinnacle Bank Arena is a pretty big upgrade from past years convention held at Pershing Auditorium, but with the yearly increases in

FFA membership and the growing number of schools offering Agriculture Education and FFA, Pinnacle Bank is a perfect location. Fifteen schools in the state want to offer programs beginning in the fall of 2015, which would be a 10 percent increase in the number of schools. Nebraska currently has 157 schools offering the programs.

As for the Elgin FFA, well they are competing quite nicely with those 156 other chapters in the state. Three members of the Elgin FFA Chapter returned home champions in their proficiency area last week during the 2015 Nebraska State FFA Convention.

Junior, Trey Baum was the Beef Entrepreneurship State Champion. Senior, Trent Bauer was Small Animal Care and Management Entrepreneurship Champion and Brandon Funk, freshmen attending NECC was the Grain Placement State Champion. Their applications will advance to nationals for review in hopes of placing during the National FFA Convention next October in Louisville, KY. Justin Funk a sophomore was the 3rd overall individual in Diversified Crop Placement.

<u>State FFA Degrees</u> were awarded to: Jon Meis, Morgan Childers, Baylie Schiltmeyer, Christian Dunn, Ethan Fischer, Tanner Welding, and Trent Bauer

Leadership Skills Events (LSE's):

Marie Meis made finals in a group of 24 and was State Runner-Up in Creed Speaking. Karissa Dicke made finals in a group of 24 and was State Runner-Up in Cooperative Speaking. Both girls are alternates to the National FFA Convention and received a cash prize. Alois Warner qualified for state with his speech in the Natural Resource Speaking Category. Although he did not make the final four, he was in the top 1/4, receiving a gold merit award.

Career Development Events (CDE's):

Natural resources- Dylan widger, Zooey Bergman, Elianne Heilhecker, Kalin Henn- 17th place team, Elianne earned a purple ribbon.

Welding - Andrew Fangman was 6th overall in MIG welding and received a purple.

Agriscience- Lydia Behnk, Cole Preister, Calli Krebs, Liam Heithoff were the 11th place team out of 107 teams. Calli received a purple ribbon while Lydia and Liam both received blue ribbons.
