# Duet Acting State Champs! 



On Thursday, March 24, the EPS Speech Team wrapped up another successful season. The team competed at the State Speech Championships in Kearney.

Eleven team members represented EPS at the state contest in eight different events. Four of the eight events qualified for finals that day, and the team brought home thirteen state medals.

Alois Warner and Kenny Bush captured top honors on the day. They were crowned D2 Duet Acting State Champions. Leslie Linares placed fourth in Entertainment Speaking. The OID of Dylan Widger, Linares, Morgan Carpenter, Lydia Behnk, and Kira Widger placed 5th. The OID of Warner, Bush, Zoey Bergman, Taya Voborny, and Jaime Hoefer placed 7th.

Both Kira Widger and Dylan Widger received Superior Ratings in Poetry. Katie Polk also earned Superior Ratings in both Serious Prose and Persuasive Speaking.

Overall as a team, the EPS Speech squad tied for sixth place with Leigh out of thirty-two teams in Class D2.
Co-coaches Jessie Reestman and Stacy Shumake-
Henn were more than pleased with the results. " From back-to-back district championships to qualifying a record number of events for state, to getting four events in finals and bringing home thirteen state medals, this group has topped the charts in everything."

The coaches attribute the team's success to their work ethic. "Our kids are involved in so many different activities that practice time can be limited. They do a terrific job of juggling their schedules to make it work. Plus, they are all so talented. We also have a phenomenal group of senior leaders this year. We will miss Alois, Widge, Katie, Morgan, Leslie and Ingvild next year. There is no end to their work ethic and their talent."

Parents should remember that children need free time in the summer to relax and enjoy the pleasures of childhood. So summer reading should be fun. Following are a few tips to make reading enjoyable for your children this summer:

1. Read Aloud together with your child every day.
2. Set a good example.
3. Read the same book your child is reading and discuss it.
4. Let kids choose what they wan $t$ to read, and don't turn your nose up at popular fiction.
5. Buy books on tape, especially for a child with a learning disability.
6. Take your children to the library regularly.
7. Subscribe, in your child's name, to magazines that may interest them.
8. Make trips a way to encourage reading by reading aloud traffic signs, billboards, notices.
9. Encourage children to keep a summer scrapbook.

Update your Activities Resume at EducationQuest.org. Include extracurricular activities, honors, awards, and part-time jobs.
Look for scholarships. Check out ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org for Nebraska-based scholarships. And pay attention to scholarships current seniors have received.
Find a summer job to help pay for college expenses. Ask prospective employers if they offer education assistance programs.

# Sports Physicals \& Impact Testing Scheduled <br> On May 18th there will IMPACT (Immediate Post-Concussion Assessment and 

 Cognitive Testing) baseline testing done at EPS High School in the high school computer lab. This is a baseline concussion test that all athletes need to take every two years. This is a tool that can help health care professionals track recovery of cognitive processes following concussion. Anyone considering going out for any athletic sport next year that will be in grades $7,9,10,11$, and 12 are REQUIRED to take the test AT EPS so that we have records of it. This also includes any 6 th grade boys that will be participating in JH football. If there are any conflicts or this is a problem please contact Mr. Becker at 843-2455.

The following times have been set aside for specific grades:
(The grades will be what grade the student is in next year)
4:00-6th grade boys, 7 th grades boys and girls
5:00-9th \& 10th grade
6:00 11th \& 12th grade
Test will take approximately 30 minutes. If there are any conflict please contact Mr. Becker.

There will also be sports physicals offered during this time at the AMH clinic in Elgin from 4:00-7:00. Any student wishing to participate in a sport next year needs to have a physical. Doing it on this night is optional but they are offering a discounted rate of $\$ 25$ dollars. If you wish to file it with your insurance company they can do that as well as long as you bring your insurance card. We ask you to please consider utilizing this offer so you do not have to worry about it during the summer.

Elgin students including Dylan Widger, Taya Voborny, Paige Nichols, Jaime Hoefer and Austin Dohmen were among the students that attended the conference.Over the 3 day conference, students were able to participate in competitive events such as STAR Events, and attend several sessions and workshops led by many inspiring speakers on relevant youth issues. Topics included leadership development, peer education, entrepreneurship, nutrition and wellness, healthy relationships, and much more.

The students who attended the conference got the chance to listen to the conference keynote speaker Alex Sheen. Alex is the founder of the movement because I said I would, a social movement and non-profit dedicated to betterment of humanity through promises made and kept. He has been featured on The Today Show, ABC World News, and The Los Angeles Times. He once walked over 240 miles across the state of Ohio in 10 days to fulfill a promise. Gardening From Mrs. Borer in $3^{\text {rd }}$ Grade

The $3^{\text {rd }}$ graders have started studying plants and animals in Science class. We have learned about the life cycle of plants starting from seed and growing into a plant. The $3{ }^{\text {rd }}$ graders planted bean seeds into clear plastic cups to see firsthand the life cycle of a bean plant.


Students were divided into three groups according to the type of soil they used for their bean seed. One group used potting mix. Another group used sand while the last group used gravel from the playground. The students made predictions on which plant will grow best. They will record data on the growth of their seeds each week. We will continue to check and record data on the growth of the plants until the end of the school year to see which type of soil is the winner.

## New Student

 Information System for 2016-17Many changes are coming in Elgin Public's student information system for next school year. We have used Schoolmaster since 2002 and we are now making the switch to JMC Student Record Management Software.

It is a web based system that will allow office staff and teachers to enter information from any internet connected device. Although the format of the website will be different from Schoolmaster PASS, parents will still be able to access student's grades, attendance, and progress reports. Parents will also be able to view all contact information and make necessary changes.

JMC will also offer a messaging system similar to Blackboard Connect that we now use. When it is implemented, parents can enter many phone contacts and email contacts and specify whether phone numbers get calls or texts for snow closure, reminder calls, etc.

The main reason for making the switch is for state reporting. JMC will be updating to the new format for state reporting. Each year, student information, grades, attendance, etc. are submitted to the state directly from our student information system.

So although it will look a little different and it will take a little time to get all set up, JMC will serve us well as a great communication tool between home and school.
