


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

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Four seniors from Elgin Public School participate in the Fridays @ Northeast.

Fridays @ Northeast program is an opportunity for high school seniors to spend Fridays on NECC campus as college students using NECC's lab spaces and classrooms. The courses offered through Fridays @ Northeast allow an introduction to a variety of programs of study. Programs of study

for the 2017-2018 school year include Agriculture and Horticulture, Applied Technology, Business and Technology, Early Childhood Education, and Health and Wellness. Recently added is for Spring 2018 is a course in Science, Technology, and Math, called Introduction to Engineering Design. Students receive dual credit for these courses, meaning that they receive high school as well as college credit.

Shelby Dohmen and Myranda Palmer are currently enrolled in a Nurse's Aide course that is designed to meet the Nebraska Health and Human Services System training requirements for nurse aide certification (CNA) and employment in long-term care facilities. Students in this course spend part of their instruction in state-of-the-art health labs, getting hands-on experience in the nursing profession. After successfully passing the examination and completing the application procedure, the students' names will be placed on the basic nurse aide registry at the Nebraska Health & Human Services Regulation & Licensure, Credentialing Division.



Seniors Liam Heithoff and Ashton Evans are enrolled in a Lifetime Wellness course that is designed to develop an understanding of the principles necessary to promote lifetime wellness. Critical issues that affect health are covered, such as stress, nutrition, weight control, physical fitness, disease, substance abuse, and human sexuality.

Elgin Public School also currently provides several other similar opportunities for its students, including dual credit courses offered in college-prep Math courses through EPS's classroom teacher, Mrs. Becky Lindgren; online dual- and college credit-only courses through NECC; a distance learning course through Central Community College; and courses for both high school only and dual credit via Nebraska Virtual Instruction Source.

Balancing Checkbooks in Personal Finance

In Personal Finance, students are learning how to balance a checkbook. Although checkbooks are considered "old-

school", learning how to manage a checking account is still an important skill. Here are some reasons why everyone should have a checking account.

- 1) A checking account is safe and easy to use.
- 2) It's a safe place to store money and easily accessible.
- 3) The alternatives to a checking account tend to be more expensive and less safe. (Prepaid debit cards, check-cashing services, gift cards, credit cards, etc.)
- 4) A person typically needs a checking or savings account before they can open a credit card.
- 5) Some bills (utilities, insurance, taxes, etc.) may charge a fee to pay with a credit card. A person can save money if they paid using cash, a check, or a debit card.
- 6) Checks show proof that someone was paid. Cash does not leave a paper trail.
- 7) A debit card can be linked to a checking account. Debit cards are a convenient way to pay for items instead of writing a check.



English Students Finish Busy First Quarter

The EPS English students have been busy applying what they've learned over the past several weeks. In addition to the typical vocabulary, grammar, and writing assignments, classes have recently covered a variety of literary genres.

In English 12, as a part of the British Literature unit, students created rune projects. After selecting particularly meaningful characters from this archaic alphabet, they scripted them together in a variety of formats. They are now in the midst of tackling *Beowulf* and comparing it to their earlier reading of *The Odyssey*.

Members of the Junior English class have been focusing on American literature, specifically poetry. After revering their school cars in poems characteristic of Native American literature, they moved onto Puritan poetry. This resulted in the annual English 11 Bad Poetry Slam.

English 10 students finished up their reading of *The Miracle Worker* and enjoyed a viewing of the classic movie. They have now moved onto *Of Mice and Men*, which will provide them much inspiration for their upcoming essays.

As an introduction to Greek mythology, the freshmen completed a Twelve Olympians project. The majority of the class completed trading cards for their assigned god/goddess, while two created action figures. The objective was to become familiar with a character and share his/her attributes with the class.

Commissioner of Education Explains the Statewide Decrease in ELA Scores

At NDE we realize the impact of the more rigorous college and career aligned statewide assessments has affected school and district English Language Arts scores. NDE will <u>not</u> be comparing the new ELA results from the 2016-2017 assessments with the NeSA-Reading data. NDE encourages school personnel to also avoid connecting the two years of data; NDE will not post any comparative data on the Nebraska Education Profile; and NDE will express to the media upon public release that the scores should not be compared. Comparing the data for 2017 ELA scores to 2016 Reading scores is misleading for many reasons.

<u>CCR ELA Standards</u>-First, the new English Language Arts assessments are aligned to much more rigorous state standards. The Nebraska College and Career Ready Standards of English Language Arts were written by committees of Nebraska teachers who developed them to be measures of college and career readiness. Post-secondary signed off that the standards set expectations to prepare students for success.

New Definition of "Meeting" Expectations--In addition to more rigorous content standards, the meaning of "passing" the new English Language Arts assessments is also a much higher standard. The former assessments' cut scores –NeSA-Reading--were set by determining the score that a student who was "barely proficient" would earn. Students who were "barely proficient" would have been in Meets-or "passing." The new cut scores were set to measure college and career readiness, a very different measure. Students who score in levels 1 or 2—or "passing" on the ELA test are on track for college and career readiness.

<u>Professional Expertise of Nebraska educators</u>--As always is our practice in Nebraska, NDE staff did not set the recommendations for cut scores for the English Language Arts assessments. Rather, Nebraska educator committees who work with the children in that grade level set the suggested ranges for recommendations for the ELA cut scores. It is a complex process that took seven days of professional meetings across the grades, and the grade-level educators' professional opinions set the rigor at expectations of college and career readiness.

NDE has had in place a full communication plan for three years about the change in rigor and the effect on scores that would occur on the English Language Arts assessments. When rigor increases, test scores decrease. The first year of results sets a baseline, and as school curriculum is fine-tuned, teachers adjust instructional strategies, and students are exposed to the curriculum over multiple years, scores move in an upward trend. Improving learning for students is the ultimate goal, and assuring that Nebraska students are prepared for college and post-secondary careers is key to the vision of AQuESTT. We began the communication about the change in 2014. We have continued the message over the three years, through media releases and consistent messaging to educators—and will continue to throughout the releases of 2017 results.
