As the first quarter ends and the second guarter begins, the math students are getting into their math routine. Geometry already covered what I consider the hardest material of the course. The rest of the curriculum builds off that material, as well as information the students have already been introduced to in previous math courses. My algebra students are building on their skill set for solving problems. Calculus students have been given their first glimpse into the power of derivatives.

Computer Science Principles students are jumping back and forth between the course curriculum and learning what is in store for the CyberPatriot competition. They are learning about three new operating systems: Windows Server 16, Debian8, and Ubuntu (the operating system for MacIntosh). It is amazing how quickly they figure out how to navigate the different platforms to fix security issues. I am looking forward to seeing how they work as a team during the first official round on November 2nd-4th.

Digital Citizenship

In elementary guidance, the 5th graders complete a unit on Digital Citizenship. I use Netsmartz.org, but another free resource that is available not only to educators but also parents is Common Sense Media.

I combine content from both Netsmartz and Common Sense Media with a few Julia Cook's books: But It's Just a Game, Cell Phoney, & The Technology Tail.

The topic of Digital Citizenship is important and I cover bits and pieces of it K-6, but in 5th grade, students cover the topics of digital citizenship more in depth: internet safety, digital footprint, cyber bullying, gaming addiction, fake news, and social media etiquette.

Why 5th grade? Each year, I do a quick survey to determine which students have cell phones, play online games, or have social media accounts. In the three years I've taken my non-scientific poll, there is a percentage of 5th-grade students with access to such devices and the percentage grows considerably from 5th grade to 7th grade. As a preventive school counselor, it is important to have conversations about digital behaviors prior to a large percentage of students having access.

To keep our students safe, it is not only important to talk about the dangers and risky behaviors of social media, online gaming, and such, but it is also important to talk about the health issues. Young people need our help in learning to balance online activity. Too much screen time can be unhealthy both mentally and physcially.

It is also important to consider all of the "types" of screen time: passive consumption like watching TV, reading, and listening to music; interactive consumption like playing games and browsing the Internet; communication like texting, video-chatting, and using social media; and content creation, which is using devices to make a product like digital art or music. The 5th graders are currently keeping a weekly schedule in which they keep track of how they spend their time outside of school. We will then create pie graphs that illustrate each students' screen time verses non-screen time. The illustration will be a good conversation starter for our class and for parents!

NEBRASKA STUDENTS RANK HIGH COMPARED TO PEER STATES ON ACT

Nebraska achievement levels kept pace with the national average on the ACT entrance exam that measures college readiness in English, reading, mathematics, and science.

This was the first year nearly 100% of graduates took the ACT as part of a statewide assessment. Nebraska started offering the ACT for free to all juniors in 2017. Nebraska's average 2018 ACT composite score is 20.1. The national average is 20.8 but nationally only 55% of students take the ACT.

Of the 17 states with 100% percent or more graduates taking the ACT, only Kentucky, Ohio, Utah and Wisconsin scored better. This is significant. States that test a high percentage of graduates tend to have lower averages as the scores include more students who are not on a college course-taking track.

As expected the state average was lower than last year's score of 21.4. The drop was anticipated due to the increase in the number of students taking the ACT. The number of graduating seniors who took the ACT rose by more than 5,500 up from 18,993 in 2017 to 24,516 in 2018. The highest possible ACT score is 36.

The following are among the other key findings from this year's Nebraska ACT data:

Nebraska scores fell evenly across all four ACT subject areas. Students scored an average of 19.4 in English compared to 20.9 in 2017 and 20.2 nationally. In reading Nebraska students scored an average of 20.4 compared to 21.9 in 2017 and 21.3 nationally. In math Nebraska students scored an average of 19.8 compared to 20.9 in 2017 and 20.5 nationally. And in science Nebraska students scored an average of 20.1 compared to 21.5 in 2017 and 20.7 nationally.

- Compared to the 17 states where 100% of graduates took the ACT, Nebraska had the 4th highest percent of students meeting the ACT English, math and science benchmarks and the 8th highest percent of students meeting the reading benchmark.
- 81% of students who took the ACT have postsecondary education plans.
- Nebraska's STEM score—a combined measure of math and science designed to predict readiness for success in STEM majors in college—is close to the national average (20.2 versus 20.9) and down from the 2017 state score of 21.5.
- Nebraska achievement gaps between Hispanic and African American students and their white and Asian American counterparts remain substantial. While 41 percent of Asian American students and 42 percent of white students showed strong readiness for college coursework, just 15 percent of Hispanic students and only 7 percent of African American students earned that same level of achievement.
