Seniors...have you visited your top colleges?
If you haven't done so already, visit your top colleges soon to narrow your choices. Application deadlines will start hitting later this this fall. Follow these tips for a successful visit:

- Contact the admissions office at least two weeks in advance to schedule your visit. Make appointments with an admissions representative, financial aid counselor, and a faculty member in the area of study that interests you.
- Check out the college website before your visit. Most college sites have a section for prospective students where you can learn about the admissions process, types of majors, student services, and employment opportunities. You might even be able to schedule your campus visit online.
- Visit while school is in session. You won't get the true flavor during breaks or finals week.
- Ask LOTS of questions. See this Go.Visit.College! handout for good questions to ask.
- Winning the scholarship game
- Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:
- Don't pay for scholarship searches! Use free search sites including ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org where you'll find over 2,000 state and local awards. Scholarship resources are also available at your local library and at EducationQuest offices in Kearney, Lincoln and Omaha.
- Visit your guidance office weekly for information about local scholarships.
- Get organized. Place scholarship applications in deadline order and prioritize each award. Local and college-specific scholarships deserve top priority because you're more likely to earn them.
- Continually update your activities, honors and volunteer or paid jobs using the Activities Resume at EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline.
- Pay close attention to grammar and spelling. Ask at least two people to proofread your application.

# Child Development Class Begins

Singing, or talking, is one of many activities you should do with your child. The nine Senior girls in Child Development are learning about what the parents should do to help their child grow, as well as what goes on in their child's brain. We started off learning about why the childhood years are so important and why you need to study children.
By studying young kids, you can gain many skills, understand yourself, as well as helping you build for your future. Learning about the child's brain and how it develops was a major contributor to our lesson. For example, the environment they grow up in and what their heredity is like can determine how a child will end up in life. Then we moved on to fetal and pregnancy development. During the first three months of a baby's life, they only weigh less than an ounce and are less than 3 inches long in size. We did an activity with tear apart licorice and cut it into the different sizes to show how a baby grows while developing. It was amazing to see that even during the first month, the internal organs and the circulatory systems start to form and the heart begins to beat. We have much more to learn and are excited to see how babies grow up.

## Nebraska Performance Accountability System

Elgin Public once again has taken part in the Nebraska Performance Accountability System, NePAS for short. NePAS is the result of a Federal requirement of State governments to provide additional accountability on local school districts. Basically what the system does is ranks school districts on three areas and three grade configurations. 1) STATUS, district rankings based on state test results (NeSA) in reading, writing, math and science 2) IMPROVEMENT, which ranks districts on the level of improvement in reading and math, based on the scores of students in the same grade year to year (different students) 3) GROWTH, district rankings based on the reading and math scores of the same students this year compared to last year. NePAS ranks districts by elementary (grades 3-5), middle school (grades 6-8) and high school (grades 9-12).

As a district it is our goal is to ensure that students gain the skills and knowledge to function as creative, discerning, and productive members of a global society. In order to do this we must be responsive to the data NePAS provides us while balancing our desire to produce the type of people that are creative discerning, and productive members of a global society since data does not always reflect common sense solid values and character. Please make sure that you look at your local papers and next month's newsletter for this year's results. I think you'll be proud of the student's performance and their improvements. Congratulations to the teachers and students for their hard work to improve Elgin Public's NePAS scores.
