## Wonderful World of Water

Six freshman and six sophomores from Elgin Public Schools attended the 25th annual Wonderful World of Waters program in Pierce on Wednesday September 17th. Here is some information about the day from Beth Walsh, Information \& Education Coordinator of Upper Elkhorn Natural Resources District:
The $25^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary of the Wonderful World of Water Festival was celebrated September 17 at Gilman Park in Pierce. Twenty-six teams of ninth and tenth grade students from 14 schools across Northeast Nebraska descended upon the park for a day of outdoor hands on activities and a chance to via for championship honors.
The day began with registration at Gilman Park followed by the teams competing in a track of hands-on activities focusing on water quality and other water related issues. The teams were then quizzed regarding those sessions to accumulate points for the competition. Following the educational sessions, the teams were given one last chance to extend their point totals by participating in the Dripial Pursuit Trivia Game. Then while the final totals were being calculated each team was given the opportunity to participate in the Wonderful World of Water special project.

The special project for this year was Water Rockets, which is, a program taught through the Jr. Academy of Sciences. Each school was invited to build water rockets and demonstrate their knowledge of mass, velocity and engineering. The rockets were judged on distance and creativity. Several rockets were launched Wednesday with prizes being awarded.

Schools participating in this year's event included; Clearwater-Orchard High School, Niobrara High School, Lynch Public School, Pierce High School, Elgin High School, Elkhorn Valley High School, Oakland Craig High School, Allen Consolidated, West Point-Beemer High School, Winside High School, Ewing High School, Madison High School, Newman Grove High School and Lyons-Decatur High School. "We are proud to be a sponsor of such a special program for Northeast Nebraska! This is the only festival for high school students in the state", commented Beth Walsh, Information \& Education Coordinator Upper Elkhorn NRD.

The Wonderful World of Water program would not be possible without our many natural resources professionals from across the area who volunteer their time each year to share their expertise and work with students who might be interested in a career related to natural resources. They come from a variety of agencies including: The Natural Resources Conservation Service; UNL Cooperative Extension; Nebraska Game \& Parks; Papio-Missouri River NRD; City of Pierce; and, the Natural Resources Districts. ## A "Flipped" Classroom <br> Submitted by Mrs. Drueke



What is this?
Whether we like it or not, technology is a part of our everyday life. Nearly every household has access to one or even multiple electronic devices. Today's student spends hours every week online. Because of this, a new trend in education is on the rise; it is known as a flipped classroom. A true flipped classroom would function something like this:
The direct instruction or lecture portion of the class will become the homework. This will primarily be in the form of watching videos and completing online practices that have been created either by myself or someone else. When students come to class the next day we will briefly discuss what they learned in the videos and answer any questions they may have. The rest of the class time will be used for practicing the concepts from the video (homework in the traditional setting).

The many advantages to this include:

1. Students can watch a video on their own. They can pause and rewind whenever they need to review what they heard.
2. In a traditional model, if a student had questions about problems they were doing at home, they had to wait until class time the next day. With this method, students are doing the work in the classroom and are able to get their questions answered immediately.
3. Flipping the instruction helps struggling students. By doing the work in the classroom, I will be readily available to help students.
4. Learning is student-centered, not teacher-centered. Focus is not on the teacher teaching the content but on the student practicing and producing quality work.
5. There is more interaction between teacher-student and student-student. Since I won't be spending as much of the class time in instruction, there is more time for me to answer student questions, work with small groups, and guide the learning of each student.
6. Work time during class allows students to be working while I have individual writing conferences with students. It creates a time for students to receive feedback, so they may improve their writing skills.

## Maintaining a Balance

We are still learning how to best utilize this method of learning. It is my goal to use this for our grammar, usage, and mechanics portion of the curriculum. We still have class assignments and discussions on literature and writing, where we can grow and learn from one another. Hopefully with this type of format, we can have the best of both worlds, face-to-face learning and technology-driven learning.

Scholarship resources are also available through your school counselor's office and at EducationQuest offices in Kearney, Lincoln and Omaha.

Focus on college-based and local scholarships. You're more likely to earn them over large national awards.
Continually update your activities, honors and volunteer or paid jobs using the Activities Resume at EducationQuest.org.

Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.

Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline.

Pay close attention to grammar and spelling. Ask at least two people to proofread your application.
