The Elgin Elementary School is proud to announce its recent recognition as a 2012 National Blue Ribbon School. It is a tribute to the hard work and dedication of the teachers and staff. The elementary school students met or exceeded their grade level standards in reading and mathematics as reported by the state wide Nebraska State Accountability Assessments (NeSA).

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program honors public and non-public elementary, middle and high schools whose students achieve at very high levels or have made significant progress and helped close gaps in achievement, especially among

disadvantaged and minority students. The program is part of a larger U.S. Department of Education effort to identify and disseminate knowledge about best school leadership and teaching practices.

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program sets a standard of excellence for all schools striving for the highest level of achievement. Each year since 1982, the U.S. Department of Education has sought out schools where students attain and maintain high academic goals. Using standards of excellence evidenced by student achievement measures and the characteristics known from research to exemplify school quality, the Department celebrates outstanding schools from states across the country.

For many schools, attaining the National Blue Ribbon School award and recognition is a realization of a long-held dream. There is much excitement in the school community and the local media eagerly profiles schools that have attained the recognition. The schools are honored at an awards ceremony in Washington, DC, where each Blue Ribbon School receives a plaque and flag to signify its National Blue Ribbon School status. These schools serve as models for other schools throughout the nation and details of their achievements are shared on the U.S. Department of Education's website.

Babies Can't Wait

Babies can't wait! Babies grow and learn rapidly from the minute they are born. If a baby is not learning or growing appropriately he can't wait for help. If you have concerns about your



baby or another child's development, the Early Development Network can help.

The Early Development Network helps children birth to 3 vears of age and their families access services and supports. If a child's development is delayed or if he has been diagnosed with a health condition that will affect his development, the Early Development Network will help his family access an evaluation of his skills in five areas of development: cognitive, motor, speech and language, social -emotional, and adaptive behavior. The evaluation is conducted in the child's home with trained professionals and is provided at no cost to the family.

After the evaluation is completed, the family and the services coordinator meet with the person or persons who conducted the evaluation and a representative of the local school district to discuss the results and to determine what services the child needs. This team works with the family to develop an Individual Family Services Plan (IFSP). The services are provided in the child's home or other setting natural to the child so that learning happens in a setting best suited to the child. The Early Development Network can also help families identify areas of need and assist with accessing services and supports such as respite care and financial assistance for medical treatment.

Early childhood services help babies and children to learn and grow. Research has shown that the earlier children with delays receive instruction and/or therapy, the more likely they are to learn to communicate, to move independently, and to learn to interact with others appropriately.

Seniors...have you visited your top colleges?

If you haven't done so already, visit your top colleges *soon* to naryour choices. Application deadlines will start hitting later this fall! Follow these tips for a successful visit:

Contact the admissions office at least two weeks in advance to schedule your visit. Make appointments with an admissions representative, financial aid counselor, and a faculty member in the area of study that interests you.

Check out the college website before your visit. Most college sites have a section for prospective students where you can learn about the admissions process, types of majors, student services, and employment opportunities. You might even be able to schedule your visit online.

Visit while school is in session. You won't get the true flavor during breaks or finals week.

Ask LOTS of questions. See this <u>Go. Visit. College! handout</u> for good questions to ask.

Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

- ◆ Don't pay for scholarship searches! Use free search sites including <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at My.EducationQuest.org where you'll find over 2,000 state and local awards. Scholarship resources are also available at your local library and at Education-Quest offices in Kearney, Lincoln and Omaha.
- Visit your guidance office for information about local scholarships.
- ♦ Get organized. Place scholarship applications in deadline order and prioritize each award. Local and college-specific scholarships deserve top priority because you're more likely to earn them.
- Continually update your activities, honors and volunteer or paid jobs using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at My.EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline.
- **Pay close attention to grammar** and **spelling**. Ask at least two people to proofread your application.

Step-Up to Writing!

Green means Go, **Yellow slow down** and red means stop, but what does this have to do with Junior High Language Arts? Using the components of Step-Up to

Writing the 7th & 8th Graders have been highlighting paragraphs and using the techniques to make them become better writers. Green means go with the topic; this is the main idea of our essay. Yellow means we are going to slow down and use a transition to state our important ideas. Then we need to stop (red) and give lots of examples, explanations, or evidence to support our ideas. The last sentence or paragraph of the essay is also green, because we conclude by "going" back to our topic sentence and restating what our essay is all about. By using the stoplight colors the students can see if they are writing a good, organized essay.

The 2012 Nebraska State Accountability Assessment results were recently released to the public. Elgin Public Schools would like to recognize some outstanding student accomplishments. Blake A., Mykil C., Elianne H., Nicklaus H., Myranda P., Kaitlyn P., Alois W., Kira W., all scored in the 90th percentile or above on the Math portion of the assessment. Zoey B., Shelby D., Theanna D., Elianne H., Liam H., Nicklaus H., Jamie H., Angela R., Carter S., Emily W., Luke W., Alois W., Kira W., all scored in the 90th percentile or above on the Reading portion of the assessment. Mykil C., Nicklaus H., Mateo K., Angela R., Tiarra T., Alois W., Dylan W., all scored in the 90th percentile or above on the Science portion of the assessment.

To score in the 90th percentile means the student scored as well as or better than 90% of student in their grade on that assessment. In other words these students' scores are in the top 10% of students in their grade. I would also like to commend the 6^{th} grade as 100% of the class met or exceeded the standard in reading. Also, the 11th grade as 100% of the junior class met or exceeded the standard in science. We are proud of all of these students as we continue to strive for excellence in all grade levels and on all local, state, and national tests.
