Constitution and Citizenship Day was celebrated in the social studies classroom on September 17th. Students learned why the U.S. Constitution is special and some fun facts about it.

It is the oldest and shortest written Constitution of any major government in the world. It took roughly four months to create.

Thomas Jefferson did not sign the Constitution. He was in France during the Convention, where he served as the U.S. minister. John Adams was serving as the U.S. minister to Great Britain during the Constitutional Convention and did not attend either.

The oldest person to sign the Constitution was Benjamin Franklin (81). The youngest was Jonathan Dayton of New Jersey (26). Because of his poor health, Benjamin Franklin needed help to sign the Constitution. As he did so, tears streamed down his face.

The students also learned why we celebrate Constitution and Citizenship Day. "Constitution Day and Citizenship Day is a combined event that is annually observed in the United States on September 17. This event commemorates the formation and signing of the Constitution of the United States on September 17, 1787. It also recognizes all who, by coming of age or by naturalization, have become US citizens.

I asked students to write up something about their trip to wonderful World of Water this year because I could not attend. Thank you, Lydia, for your article!

Wonderful World of Water



Wednesday, September 16, several Freshmen and Sophomores had the chance to experience Wonderful World of Water in Pierce, Nebraska. This was their twenty-sixth


year hosting the event and my second year attending it.

We started the day off by splitting into separate teams and tracks. Sophomores were on track one and the Freshmen team participated in track two. The first station Sophomores checked in at educated us on different species of reptiles and amphibians. We saw everything from box turtles to a legless and armless lizard. He had many different breeds of snakes, and if you were brave enough, you were given the opportunity to hold one; needless to say, I was not one of those daring students.

Our second station talked about biodiversity, and through a game we learned how a species' population can fluctuate and decrease. After that station, we moved on to one about invasive plants and noxious weeds. Some examples of these plants include Canada thistle, leafy spurge, musk thistle, plumeless thistle, purple loosestrife, and salt cedar.

Following that station, we attended one educating us about different soils. Through many different experiments we saw the difference in performances of the non-tilled soil and the over tilled soil. We found that the less you till your soil, the better it is for organic matter and providing plants with

efficient nutrients and water. Afterwards we went to our final station on water insects. We learned what classifies different critters as insects; we were then sent off to find our own aquatic insects. We split up into our teams, and used a Dnet to fish out the different species of water insects. We then dumped them into one



Following each of these stations we were given small quizzes to see how much knowledge we retained from each station. Later, after completing these five stations, we broke up for lunch and talked amongst ourselves while the judges graded and tallied our quizzes.

To end the day we played a trivia game against other Sophomore teams. We placed third in this event, then we watched as the other teams shot off their homemade water bottle rockets. Following this event, teams received their awards. Although we placed fifth, I gained a lot of knowledge from attending Wonderful World of Water, and I would highly suggest it to incoming Freshman and returning Sophomores.

This fall, over 150 Nebraska high schools are holding Apply2College events during the school day to help seniors complete college applications. Whether or not your school is participating, here are some tips and resources to help you prepare for the application process.

Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

- ◆ **Don't pay for scholarship services!** Use free resources including <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org with over 2,000 Nebraska-based awards. Free resources are also available through your school counselor's office and at EducationQuest offices in Kearney, Lincoln and Omaha.
- Focus on college-based and local scholarships. You're more likely to earn them over large national awards.
- Continually update your activities, honors and volunteer or paid jobs using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- ♦ Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Give them advance notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your Activities Resume.
- ♦ Ask at least two people to proofread your application.

From the desk of the Superintendent . . .

The 2015-2016 Budget is the really big news from the superintendent's office this fall. With the conservative financial leadership of the board the school has stayed VERY progressive in updates to the facilities, transportation and technology while at the same time has more money "on hand" than there has been in quite some time. This factor, along with a small rise in other apportioned money from the state AND the name plate capacity tax from the wind tower projects has allowed us to actually ask for LESS money from the patrons of district 18. The Over-all budget itself will grow, as the state only allows fixed small growth every year and if you don't capture that, you lose it. For example if you don't take your growth allowed for two years---say 5% (2.5% a year) and the third year you need to grow more than 2.5% to meet bills, you cannot. You would have to dip into reserves or cut something to get back to the 2.5% you are allowed. With that said, even though the budget will grow the allowed amount on the revenue side (with the funds on hand, more money from the state and name plate capacity tax) it requires over 300,000 less dollars to come from property tax. Bottom line?? You will pay approximately 11% less in property taxes. Even with the valuation of the district increasing an average of 16%, tax bills will be down approximately 11%. Obvious good news to the patrons of District 18 as first estimates are that we will have one of the three lowest total levies in the state of Nebraska, while at the same time providing a very progressive and modern education for our students.

In other performance related news. Elgin Public continues to do VERY well on the state assessments and the "measuring sticks" that the politicians use to determine good schools. While meeting some of those requirements by all the testing, reporting and tracking, can be cumbersome at best; it does help us keep in focus that the reason for public schools is not all about activities, sports, appearances, etc. but rather the education of every child that chooses to walk through our doors regardless of circumstance. With that in mind we are very proud of the work we do and the accomplishments of our students and will continue to focus on the teaching to, and learning of children as our number one responsibility. All students in grades three through eleventh are tested in reading and math, in addition grades five, eight and eleven are tested in science and fourth, eighth and eleventh also take the state writing exam.
