





#### It's FAFSA time!

Beginning October 1, you and your parents can complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). Follow these tips to prepare:

Create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You and a parent will each need an FSA ID to access and sign the FAFSA.

Attend an EducationQuest Financial Aid Program (FAP) to learn about the FAFSA and the financial aid process. If you attend, *you'll be eligible to register for* a \$500 scholarship! FAPs will be held at high schools across the state.

**Review the FAFSA Checklist** at EducationQuest.org to determine items you'll need to complete the FAFSA.

## From the desk of the Superintendent . . .

This is the time of year when government entities do their budgets and set tax requests for the year. It is always a busy and stressful time for people in charge of those tasks and duties. It is also a very negative time in the state of Nebraska due to the burden of taxes on the taxpayer.

One of the things I have learned is that any tax is too much tax to most taxpayers. Elgin public Schools is blessed with a large valuation, and in comparison with every district I have worked in throughout my 26 year career in education, pays far lower taxes than any of them for their public school. Not only that, but due to the conservative fiscal nature of our board and the influx of wind tower taxes, Elgin Public Schools District #18 will LOWER its TAX ASKING for the second straight year. It will also allow the school to operate for several years below the tax asking that was required for the 2013-2014 school year. That is almost unheard of in the world of property tax and school tax asking of its patrons. Those who own land in other districts already know what the majority of Nebraska land owners pay in property tax for most districts and it's many times double, if not triple what is paid in district 18.

We are blessed to have a high valuation, low taxes and a conservative board that also understands we need and want an attractive, functional, successful school for our youth. Elgin enjoys a great school with quality facilities, staff and programs with up to date equipment and digital learning. We also have an attractive, safe and functional campus. Knowing that, you can relish in the fact that its operation requires a lower tax levy than 238 or so other public schools in the state (last I knew there were only 243). We thank you for your continued support, GO EAGLES!!!

## Future of Ag Campaign Kicks Off

September marks the official start of the seventh annual I Believe in the Future of Ag fundraising campaign. This campaign serves as an outlet for local FFA chapters to raise money for innovative projects in their classrooms, leadership programming, community service projects and field trips to advance agriculture education in their schools.

This year, Aurora Cooperative, BigIron Auctions, Central Valley Ag, CPI, DEKALB/Asgrow and Verdesian committed \$20,000 each to the campaign. Other sponsors, contributing \$10,000 each, include: Bayer CropScience, CoBank, Country Partners Cooperative, CHS Foundation, GrainBridge, FMC, Farm Credit Services of America, Farmers Cooperative, First National Bank Omaha, Frontier Coop, Koch Fertilizer, Lindsay Corporation, Nebraska Farm Bureau, Pinnacle Bank, Producers Livestock, Valley Irrigation and WinField Solutions.

100 percent of each local donation will be sent back to the designated chapter at the end of the campaign and the Nebraska FFA Foundation, along with its corporate partners, will provide extra incentives to participating FFA chapters. This year, \$35,000 in matching funds will be distributed to participating chapters.

"Agriculture is the lifeblood of this state with one in three jobs based in agriculture. We see this campaign as integral part of local FFA chapters and the future of agriculture by providing funds to develop a rich program of activities benefiting students, their local communities and their future," says Stacey Agnew, Nebraska FFA Foundation Executive Director.



#### What are MAP assessments?

MAP stands for "Measuring Academic Progress"

MAP "Fits the test to the student, not the student to the test"

MAP provides differentiated assessment data to find the instructional level of all students

MAP provides accurate and reliable assessment data across a common and stable scale (like a ruler or yardstick)

MAP gives teachers additional information to help make decisions about your child's education

#### What are the main features of MAP testing?

MAP testing is "computer adaptive" meaning that questions will adapt to the student's achievement level

MAP tests are not timed, students may take as much time as they need

MAP measures and reports student growth over time.
