




Five Reasons You Should Study Math



According to The Complete University Guide here are five reasons to study math.

1. Humanity needs Math

Just look around. Some of civilization's most prized and proud achievements are wholly reliant on mathematics. Planes flying seamlessly through the air, high availability of complex medicines, even the computer you are using now: all of these increasingly vital commodities rely on the use and study of numbers. If you are to stop and think for just a few minutes it becomes inescapably clear that mathematics is pretty well inseparable from life as we know it.

2. Potential for Joint courses

Mathematics is a reasonably neutral subject and so it is easily combined with other courses. Joint Honors like <u>Mathematics & History</u>, <u>Mathematics & English</u>, <u>Mathematics & Spanish</u> or <u>Mathematics & Music</u> are but a few of the increasingly broad range of Mathematics based courses available. This rich selection of study areas shows that a Mathematics degree does not have to be purely numerical, but can involve the arts to offer literary, musical or scientific nourishment.

3. Graduate Prospects

The high level of employability is strengthened by the fact that careers involving math are typically permanent, in that numbers in whichever form they take are going to be around forever, and so money, computing and many other mathematical fields are reasonably safe career paths.


4. Transferable skills

A mathematician's skill set is not exhausted once they move out of the realm of the numerical. The facets of a student which are developed during a Mathematics degree are easily extrapolated to other situations and areas. For example, rational and logical thought is something which is required in many areas, whether it is in a moral or career capacity. Furthermore the high level of cognition required to comprehend complex mathematical theories and rules is an asset which will benefit an individual in many ways.

5. Salary advantage

On our <u>Graduate salary table</u>, mathematics falls in 12th place with \$32,000 the average starting salary, well above average. As a main motive for many students to study certain subjects, the potential pay is a definite bonus factor with mathematics, helped by the versatile nature of the skills involved.

they are wanting to try to improve composite scores, especially for scholarship applications that really start in Spring 2018.

Juniors are welcome to take ACT, but will be required to take them Spring 2018 as part of Nebraska Statewide Testing. Register at http://act.org

Another good free resource, especially for Math & Science, is KhanAcademy.org.

Elgin Public School also subscribes to On to College (formerly John Baylor Prep). Juniors and seniors have access to this prep material at school and at home, meaning that students can access videos and practice tests online any time!

It is advised that seniors who have taken the ACT already study their ACT High School Report and utilize test prep materials especially for low-scoring parts of the test.

Elgin will join communities across Nebraska,


lowa, Kansas and Wyoming in an effort to provide mentors for youth in grades three through twelve. "We are very excited to launch TeamMates Mentoring in the Elgin. The strong school and community support is evident from the work being done locally to establish the TeamMates program." Stated Sue Kennedy, TeamMates Regional Coordinator, who facilitated a local board training on Thursday, August 24th, 2017.

The TeamMates of Elgin program will begin mentoring students in the 4th through 6th grades who attend Elgin Public Schools and have established a goal of 30 matches for the 2017-2018 school year.

The TeamMates Mentoring Program was founded in 1991 by Tom and Nancy Osborne to provide support and encouragement to youth. In this school-based mentoring program, mentors come to the school one visit per week, during the school year, and meet with a student. Mentors can play games, talk, work on projects, etc. TeamMates Mentors provide a sense of hope and vision to young people, with a mission to help them reach their full potential. Today, through TeamMates, approximately, 8000 youth are being mentored one visit per week at their local school by adult volunteers.

Study Tips from the Resource Room


Assignment Book

Mathematics can be a complicated subject, especially when there are so many ways to approach it. However, this variety of approaches can also be a blessing, because among all of the different ways to attack a mathematical problem, every student can find at least one way that they can understand best.

In my math classes, we are solving problems using graphing, tables, written language, diagrams, mathematical expressions and equations, and sometimes even physical movement to represent and analyze a problem. Some students understand a verbal or written description, while others prefer to see pictures. For these, and other representations, the key is to keep exposing the students the different approaches so they can learn which method they like the best!

In geometry, we are working on deductive reasoning, which uses formulas, definitions, and foundational ideas to build our knowledge base and to solve problems. We use a lot of skills learned in algebra class to figure out the solutions.

Mr. Wemhoff has chosen GRIT as the theme for the year at Elgin Public. I found a great quote that represents the way students need to approach mathematics (and life!).
