





- Shut the screen slowly and carefully
- Open the screen slowly and carefully

- Charge battery before coming to school
- Restart the laptop at least once a week for Windows 10 updates
- Allow Windows 10 updates to finish completely





MAP TESTING COMPLETED

I am sure that you have heard some of your students come home and talk about MAP testing. This year students took their MAPS test about a month earlier then previous years. In fact the first of our MAP testing was completed the week of the August 23rd. Why? We feel the earlier the students are tested the better picture we get of the students growth or lack of growth. MAP tests are standardized test to help us assess how our students and school is performing relative to other school across the country. The MAP program takes your fall score and grade level and tells you how much our students have improved from the fall to late winter. It is a great tool for our teachers and students to see areas the students need to improve on and areas that the students are doing well at.

MAP Assessment Frequently Asked Questions

What are MAP assessments?

- * MAP stands for "Measuring Academic Progress"
- * MAP "Fits the test to the student, not the student to the test"
- * MAP provides differentiated assessment data to find the instructional level of all students
- * MAP provides accurate and reliable assessment data across a common and stable scale (like a ruler or yardstick)
- * MAP gives teachers additional information to help make decisions about your child's education

What are the main features of MAP testing?

- * MAP testing is "computer adaptive" meaning that questions will adapt to the student's achievement level
- * MAP tests are not timed, students may take as much time as they need
- * MAP measures and reports student growth over time.

What subject areas do MAP assessments measure?

- * Reading
- * Mathematics
- Language Usage
- * General Science
- * Science Concepts and Processes
