Elgin Speech Team Shines in Debut

After being unable to attend the Howells-Dodge meet as a result of snow, the EPS Speech team was finally able to compete on Friday.

The team traveled to Lindsay Holy Family and returned with a third place team finish behind Boone Central and Twin River. They also brought home a number of medals.

Top honors on the day went to the duet of Kenny Bush and Hunter Reestman, who were champions in the event and Lydia Behnk who also brought home the championship medal in Entertainment Speaking.

The duet of Taya Voborny and Zoey Bergman earned the runner-up medal, and the OID of Bush, Reestman, Voborny, Bergman and Behnk also brought home the runner-up medal.

Jaime Hoefer returned with a sixth-place medal in Serious Prose, while Kira Widger placed eighth in Poetry.

Mateo Kirstine received and Excellent Rating in Extemporaneous Speaking, and Lexi Swanson earned an Excellent Rating in Poetry.

Coaches Stacy Shumake-Henn and Jessie Reestman were very pleased with their first outing.

"Considering the weather issues that have resulted in missed practices and even an earlier meet, we were thrilled with the results. The kids have been putting in as much time as they've been able to, but we have just needed a meet. To get six of the eight events we brought into finals was really fun for the kids."

According to the coaches, they have a good number of experienced members returning, but they have also been joined by some new talent.

"We graduated a great group of seniors last year, but our returning members have really stepped up as leaders. We also have some new members this year who have been fun to watch develop. As always, we are blessed with a great group of kids who are very talented and a lot of fun."

Call to Register for Preschool

Elgin Early Learning Center will have a registration night on March 23rd at 6:30 p.m. in the preschool room. Please call the school (402-843-2455) if you are interested in enrolling



your child for the 2017-18 school year.

The preschool is divided into two sections with 3-year olds and 4-year olds attending at different times. Students who would be prospective kindergartners the following year will enroll in the morning session from 8:15 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. 5 days a week. The charge for this

session will be \$450 per school year. Full payment can be made immediately or in monthly installments of \$50.

The second session would be 3-year olds and they would attend from 12:45 p.m. - 3:30 p.m. for four days a week at a cost of \$360 per school year. Full payment can be made immediately or in monthly installments of \$40.

Midday transportation (drop-off for the morning group and pick-up for the afternoon group) will be provided within the school district boundaries. Preschool students may ride the traditional morning or afternoon bus routes if they live outside of Elgin and are in the district boundaries.


A child must be 3 or 4 years old by July 31st in order to enter the preschool. Classes are limited to 20 students per age group. Enrollment will be accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis with priority given to children who live in Elgin School District #18. All children must be potty trained.

Tuition is not charged to those families that qualify for free or reduced meals according to federal guidelines.

To enroll your 3 or 4 year old for the 2017-2018 school

year, please call the school office 402-843-2455. After student enrollment is completed, information will be sent to all parents about a registration meeting on March 23rd at 6:30 p.m. This will enable parents to complete registration paperwork on their student. If you have any

Busy Times in Math Class

These past few weeks have been busy ones for the math classes. Advanced Algebra B has just completed their finance unit. They have been using their TI-84 calculators to figure monthly payments and future values of loans and investments.

Algebra IB has been working with quadratic equations. They have been working with various methods to find the solutions of these equations. They have also been putting their graphing calculators to good use throughout this unit.

In 8th grade Algebra I, the students have spent quite a bit of time working with polynomials. They have been identifying the different types of polynomials, performing mathematical operations on polynomials, and factoring. Math 7 has been working on many geometry concepts.



Algebra IA has been continuing the study of linear equations and their graphs. They will soon begin working with the TI-84 calculator to explore how they can be used to make graphing and problem solving easier.



Spring is a very busy time in the third grade classroom. The third graders will be taking the NeSA (Nebraska State Accountability) tests next month for the very first time. Students will be tested in the areas of math and reading. They have been working hard in the classroom to get prepared. During class we have reviewed math and reading vocabulary daily to help us understand the terms that are used on the tests. The students have been going to the computer lab to familiarize themselves with the format of the test. Students have been completing practice tests both in math and reading to help ease any nerves. Please encourage your child to do their very best on these upcoming assessments. Remind them to take their time, read carefully, reread for better understanding and to check over their answers. Please remember to make sure your child gets a good night's rest before school and to eat a healthy breakfast to begin their day. A note and schedule of testing dates/times will come home at the beginning of April. Try your best and good luck third graders!

Science Fair Preparations in Full Swing



All 7-12 grade students in a science class are required to participate as part of their grade. The purpose of a science fair is to encourage inquiry and have students investigate a phenomenon for the sake of their own knowledge. We will be reviewing the Scientific Method in class and work on students' projects will begin in March. Students will get one day a week to work on projects in class but the rest will be completed on their own time. Parental involvement is encouraged so long as the student is the one in charge of the project and does most of the work. 5th Grade Poetry



It's Trig Time

As I look at the calendar, I see the end of the year approaching very guickly. I hope to cover many topics before then. However, with snow days, school activities, and illness, progress has been slow. I want to make sure that my students have learned or reviewed some trigonometric content as testing season gets in full swing. Trigonometry, the utilization of the relationship between the sides and angles of triangles, is a topic that most students will encounter in testing. Although the calculus class got started on this topic last fall, they are still finding the need for knowing those trigonometric facts. The geometry and Advanced Algebra classes have both begun to investigate those angle-side relationships. We are looking at unit circles, right triangles, and reference angles to solve problems. Does anyone know Soh Cah Toa ?



Agriculture class works with new Tower Gardens.

As a result of earning a \$2000 Working Here Fund Grant from Farm Credit Services. The Plant Science students have started the process of growing veggies in Tower Gardens. Tower Garden, a vertical, aeroponic growing system, allows us to grow up to 20 vegetables, herbs, fruits and flowers in less than three square feet—indoors or out. Basically, this is an advanced form of hydroponics. Aeroponics is the process of growing plants in an air or mist environment rather than soil. Aeroponic systems use water, liquid nutrients and a soilless growing medium to quickly and efficiently grow more colorful, tastier, better smelling and incredibly nutritious produce.

We have the gardens in the agriculture classroom now, but once our flowers come in for the greenhouse, the towers will be placed out there. The two tower gardens are planted with gourmet lettuce, basil, peppers, cherry and regular tomatoes and cucumbers. Follow the growth of the veggies on the Elgin Public School twitter account as the plant science class will tweet weekly pictures of the progress. Our end goal is to produce enough vegetables for school cafeteria lunches and donate to the senior center. It typically takes 3-5 weeks for the veggies to grow until we are able to harvest them.



How to Write Winning Scholarship Essay

PROCESS:

Research the Prompt -> Develop Concepts -> Outline -> Write -> Revise & Edit

• Spend some time on first step, which is "Research the Prompt." What is the prompt asking and WHY? Who will be reading the essay? Understand WHERE the committee is coming from in asking the prompt that they do. For example, there is a big difference between speaking to leadership in service vs. leadership in school.

• Same essay CAN NOT be used for MULTIPLE scholarships.

When developing EXAMPLE/STORY to address in essay, use most powerful example/story, NOT just the first example/story that you think of. Think of it as prom dress shopping!

POINTERS:

Uniqueness

• Use example/story that is unique and one that no one else can share.

• Example/story is vehicle to answer prompt, but be sure that it doesn't distract. Uniqueness factor helps YOUR essay rise to the top--an anchor for reader to remember. Single Focus

- Avoid listing what is already on resume.
- Avoid "I was president of my speech team, editor of school newspaper, and class president." INSTEAD pick one and build.

For Buffett, presenter said to focus on single focus per question with one thread overall. Structure

- Chronological OR Cause->Effect
- You want an example/story, but main focus of structure should tie to take away of essay. And that take away needs to be relevant and connected to prompt!

"Take away" = life lesson and how you plan to move forward from it Opening

- AVOID questions and quotes
- Action takes reader into middle of example/story
- Dialogue takes reader into action but with dialogue
- Societal statement takes adult reader into mind of young adult's societal observations

Personal - takes reader into your mind

Tone & Style

- Make YOUR voice noticeable: It shouldn't sound like a research paper.
- This is YOUR time in front of the "committee." The presenter said that scholarship committees that he's been a part of, each reader is given 7 minutes to read all application materials! That is 7 minutes to read student essay, letters of recommendation, and anything else involved with particular scholarship. **Make your 7 minutes count**!
- The presenter REALLY stressed importance of SENTENCE VARIETY as in sentence length and structure.
- O Same length sentences = flat sounding essay
- O Word choice helps with uniqueness. Don't try to sound "academic."

o Avoid clichés


Use transitions like furthermore, therefore, hence, etc. Lead reader through essay.

MAP Testing

Twice a year students at EPS are administered the MAP assessments. Earlier this year (September) they were given the first of two assessments and next week these same students will be given the second round of assessments. The information below explains in a "nutshell "why we give this assessment and why it is so important to get the best effort from every student. Testing will take place on the following dates: **February 21st, 23rd, 28th and April 1st.** Thanks for your help and please encourage your children to do the best they can.

The purpose of MAP assessments

is to provide an instructional level of our students provides a road map for students toward achieving mastery to give information to help inform instructional decisions to give immediate data and dynamic, interactive reports for parents and teachers

What are MAP assessments?

MAP stands for "Measuring Academic Progress"

MAP "Fits the test to the student, not the student to the test"

MAP provides differentiated assessment data to find the instructional level of all students

MAP provides accurate and reliable assessment data across a common and stable scale (like a ruler or yardstick)

MAP gives teachers additional information to help make decisions about your child's education

What are the main features of MAP testing?

MAP testing is "computer adaptive" meaning that questions will adapt to the student's achievement level The computer adapts questions until it finds the student's RIT level with an acceptable standard err measure MAP tests are not timed, students may take as much time as they need MAP measures and reports student growth over time.

What subject areas do MAP assessments measure?

Reading Mathematics Language Usage General Science Science Concepts and Processes

Listed below are a couple things that you as a parent can do to help your student prepare for the tests:

• Talk to your student about the test. Ask questions and let your student know you are aware of the tests and their importance.

• Help students get eight (8) hours of sleep. Being well rested promotes brain function and the ability to pay attention. Eat a healthy breakfast. Having nutritious foods prior to the test will allow students to focus more effectively.
